- Church’s elected leadership

 - I’d like to think of Peace Pods as a start of the learning process to respectfully listen and interact with grace and kindness to one another.
 - Thanks to Pastor Dave for initiating the “Stories of Peace” series. Let’s support him in making the project as effective as possible.
 - There are no “Us” and “Them” here. There are no “They” or “Those People” here. We are all in this together.
 - I look forward to reading the collected work product at its end.
- What lies ahead?
 - At the beginning of a new chapter in Church life, new Minister.
 - Re-opening post-Covid with live worship and simulcast. A great enabler for broader reach and greater effectiveness. Thanks to Pastor Dave for the vision.
 - Possibly a new use of the campus with an associated revenue stream. The developer’s financial models are varied and complex; too complex to describe here. In the original co-living model a “base” assumption set yields about \$400,000 annually over a 55 year lease period. The “risk” assumption set yields about

\$62,000 annually over that period.

- Consideration and discernment of “Peace Village”.
