


### From the Rector




### Dear friends,

In the season of Lent we are invited to do some soul searching, to commit ourselves to prayer, fasting and self denial. In more simple terms we could say that during Lent we should try some experiments and exercises that may lead us closer to God. We often make sacrifices during Lent, like giving up a simple pleasure that we enjoy in an effort to replace that with something that is good for our soul. Also, in addition to giving up things, we can also take on a new discipline. Father Andy is introducing a new "walking with a partner" program that may be of interest to you. My suggestion for us all this Lent is to take on some spiritual reading. Find a way to be less connected to computer, television and mobile phone and instead pick up a book that may feed you spiritually. Your local book store or online book seller will have plenty of selections. Father Andy and I can also help you find something appropriate to read during Lent. I have four suggestions here, all of them available in our Trinity Store across from the secretary's office:









First, Sacred Journey by Frederick Buechner is an easy read book that tells the story of one person's journey to faith. Secondly, To Bless the Space Between Us by John O'Donohue is a wonderful book of poetry and blessings that will provide good food for thought. Thirdly, An Easter Book of Days is a small easy to read book that identifies all of the characters from scripture around the story of the cross and resurrection of Jesus. Finally, Crucifixion by Fleming Rutledge is a wonderful, dense and challenging read that helps us understand more about significance of Jesus' death on the cross. I encourage you this lent to pick up a book and read- and may it be a feast for your soul.

### **Bishop's 2023 Virtual Lenten Series**

Jesus Makes the Difference

Each week during Lent, the Diocese of Atlanta is putting out a teaching series online, prepared by Bishop Robert W. Wright, offering insight on the Gospel readings we will hear over the five Sundays of Lent (February 26th to March 26th inclusive).

Says Bishop Wright: "Our purpose for releasing this lectionary based, Lenten teaching series entitled Jesus Makes the Difference is twofold: to offer Christian education in support of clergy and lay people alike and to provide a lexicon and useful way to talk about Jesus in everyday life.

"Our hope is that with the guidance and aid of the Holy Spirit, this series will help all of us increase the depth of our commitment to making Jesus the Lord of our lives and enthusiastic and skillful communicators in sharing the 'hope that is within' us with the world.'

### **Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper**

Let the Good Times Roll!



Trinitarians of all ages, come and join us in the Parish Hall on Tuesday, February 21st at 6:00 p.m. for a Shrove Tuesday celebration! We will enjoy a pancake feast prepared by Trinity staff and served by the Brotherhood of St Andrew, relax together, and sing karaoke.

Because the church's liturgy suppresses the joyous word "Allelluia!" between Ash Wednesday and Easter, on Shrove Tuesday we will also perform a lighthearted service of "Burying the Alleluias" as a symbolic transition into the season of Lent.

### Lenten Pilgrimage 2023

Stand at the crossroads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way lies; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls. (Jeremiah 6:16)

Taking on a new prayer practice or "giving something" up" during Lent can often feel like an isolated and private matter, and add to the stress of an already-busy time of year. In 2023, Trinity is exploring another way to observe a Holy Lent. Whatever your personal plans for Lent may be, this year you are also invited to take your Lenten journey outdoors and seek a moment of peace and renewal with a fellow traveler.

On the five Sundays of Lent, we will gather at 3 p.m. at a different scenic spot in Columbus to take a brief contemplative walk. Throughout these five Sundays, participants will be partnered in groups of two or three. You and your partners will share each walk, and be given open-ended prompts to inspire conversation as you stroll. These walks are simply a chance to rest in nature together, to get to know one another, and to reflect on the life of faith.

People of all ages and abilities are welcome to join the Lenten Pilgrimage, as the distance and pace of each walk is up to you and your partners. ### **Ash Wednesday at Trinity**



Trinity will mark the beginning of the Season of Lent through the traditional observance of Ash Wednesday on February 22nd, with services at noon and 6 p.m. The noon service will be held in the chapel, while the 6 p.m. service will be in the nave and include musical offerings from the Trinity choir. Both services will consist of the liturgy of the Word, the imposition of ashes, and Holy Eucharist.

Ash Wednesday is one of two solemn Fast Days designated in the church calendar, along with Good Friday. Not counting the five Sundays in Lent and Palm Sunday, there are exactly 40 days in the Lenten season, which stretches from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. These 40 days have much Biblical significance, connecting us to the 40 years the Israelites spent wandering in the desert (Numbers 14) and the 40 days Jesus faced temptation in the wilderness (cf. Luke 4). In addition to receiving the ashes on Ash Wednesday, it's appropriate to take on extra disciplines of prayer and fasting on this day to remind our whole selves—mind, body, and spirit—that as we enter Lent we are beginning a journey of repentance, renewal, and preparation for the Mysteries of Easter.

Wherever you are on your walk with God, we hope that you will join us for this year's observance of Ash Wednesday.

### **Adult Sunday School During Lent**

Opening the Bible with Bill Stahl



Are you looking to engage more deeply with Holy Scripture during Lent this year? Starting on February 26th and continuing through the five Sundays of Lent, Trinity's own Bill Stahl will return to lead a special Sunday School class. A structural engineer by training, Bill has also published a three-volume book series, *The Bible's Story of Salvation*, which helps readers make sense of the message and composition of the Bible.

Bill's Lenten Sunday school class will explore what Scripture has to say about the Way of the Cross. Beginning with Jesus' temptation in the wilderness, Bill will dive into the Biblical narratives that bring us closer to the suffering and death of Christ, and underlie the church's ancient Holy Week traditions. Adult Sunday School is held in the Parlor from around 9:30 until 10:15. We hope to see you there!

#### Schwob Music Series at Zion

Special Performance March 19th

Zion Episcopal Church in Talbotton is a rare, wooden Tudor-style worship space, constructed in 1848 from the wood of Georgia's forests. The Schwob School of Music at CSU has planned another *Schwob Music Series* at Zion concert at Zion scheduled for **Sunday, March 19th at 4:00 p.m.**, followed by a reception across the street at the Straus-LeVert Hall.

This concert will feature Dr. Aesook Moon, Trinity's own Associate Organist and Choirmaster, performing on Zion's newly-restored 1850 Pilcher Organ. The organ is the oldest and only working hand-pumped Pilcher organ in the United States. In addition to the Organ works, the performance will include instrumentalists and solo singers in a variety of music dating from across four centuries.

In this service, we'll hear scripture on our Lord's Passion, including a dramatic reading of John's Gospel. There will be a time for venerating the cross, and communion will be served from the reserved sacrament from Maundy Thursday celebrations.

8:00 PM The Great Vigil of Easter at Linwood Cemetery

This rich service begins in darkness outside Lummus Chapel with the lighting of the new fire, from which the Paschal candle is lit. Lessons are read followed by the renewal of baptismal vows. This is the first Eucharist of Easter. The service ends in the chapel in glorious light with alleluias resounding.
