



Adult Sunday School in September Christians and Muslims



Beginning September 10th, Trinity will host a three-week Sunday school class led by Dr. Ryan Lynch, Associate Dean of Honors and Interdisciplinary Studies and Assistant Professor of History at Columbus State University. Dr. Lynch's research and teaching is focused on Islamic history. During this special class, we will explore the relationship between Christians and Muslims as Dr. Lynch gives a brief survey of the contemporary Islamic world, then discusses the role of the prophets in Islam, with an emphasis on how Muslims view and understand Jesus. All Trinity parishioners are invited to attend, and encouraged to bring your all questions and your curiosity about this fascinating subject!

Adult Sunday School is held in the Trinity Parlor beginning at 9:30. We hope to see you there!


Stoller Scholarships Awarded

Stoller Scholarship

In August, Trinity awarded a total of over \$40,000 in Stoller scholarships in support of Episcopalian undergraduates from a variety of backgrounds and fields of study. College and trade school students from any parish in the Chattahoochee Valley Convocation may apply for the Stoller scholarship, which was established by the estate of Richard H. Stoller, a longtime member of Trinity. Over the past 16 years, Trinity has proudly distributed more than \$200,000 in Stoller scholarship funds to assist students in pursuit of higher education.

Trinity Choir News



Choir Member Spotlight

Rebecca Manseau

Rebecca is one of our newest choir scholars and can be found singing with her peers during worship every Sunday. Rebecca was born in Atlanta and grew up north of Columbus. She did her undergraduate studies in Politics and German at Sewanne: The University of the South where she was an active member of the University Choir. She also received a Fulbright grant to study refugee and asylum politics in Berlin, Germany. Rebecca earned a Masters degree in Political Science from the Otto Suhr Institute of Free University, Berlin as well as being involved in private vocal studies during that time. Until now, she has lived in Berlin for eight years.

Although her CV says otherwise, Rebecca has always been a singer. She realized near the end of her undergraduate studies that singing was her true calling. Rebecca was fortunate to have voices of encouragement to help her keep faith that she was on the right path, even when times were tough. Rebecca came to Columbus after contacting Professor Golden about study opportunities at the Schwob School of Music.

Career: Rebecca has worked as a teaching assistant at the Free University and in the EU/North America team at the Heinrich Böll Foundation. During the pandemic, she made the career switch to music, focusing on singing and teaching privately. Rebecca also worked with her local church choir in Berlin to rehabilitate choir members' voices after months of lockdown. Rebecca has sung in the semifinals for both the Musica Sacra competition in Rome, Italy and the Laffont Metropolitan Opera competition in Atlanta, GA. She is currently pursuing a Masters in Music in Vocal Performance at Schwob while working as a freelance copywriter/editor for travel articles and tours.

Faith: As an organist's daughter, Rebecca had the opportunity to visit a number of different churches growing up. Despite some disillusionment with church in her younger years, Rebecca always retained a sense of personal spirituality. She ultimately found her church in the Episcopalians through choir at Sewanne and found her faith through classes, humanities and astronomy in particular. What Rebecca enjoys most about the Episcopal Church is the elevated liturgy, beautiful musical tradition, and the recognition of the value of inclusivity. The feeling of community keeps Rebecca coming back.

Hobbies: Before she moved to Germany, Rebecca was an avid horseback rider and hopes to pick it back up again. She also enjoys sketching, painting, gardening, cooking and baking, and occasionally practicing the violin. Rebecca has a love for antiques, having several beloved items in Berlin, including an art deco chiming clock and a desk from the 1920s she restored.

At Trinity: Rebecca is very glad to be donning the chorister vestments and singing in the choir at Trinity. She looks forward to getting to know the congregation!
