Dear Friends,

Prayer is our way of communicating with and connecting to God. There are many forms of prayer and there is no one right way to do it. Just as our conversations with others around us can vary for all sorts of reasons, our conversations with God can be different depending on our circumstances. There is a formal way that we pray to God in our corporate worship. Our Book of Common Prayer guides our thoughts and words toward God in beautiful and poetic ways. But in other times, when we are alone, we relate to God differently. In our alone time with God we are free to express our thoughts, concerns, desires, even our praise and thanksgiving in a relaxed and informal way. Developing a daily habit of prayer is one of the most helpful things a Christian can do. But it can also be challenging. We can feel inadequate at times and we can also feel distracted and overwhelmed and neglect our relationship with God.

"Everyone of us needs half an hour of prayer each day, except when we are busy – then we need an hour."

I hope you will attend these Monday lunches. I hope that this season of Lent is a time for you to improve your prayer life, and by doing so, that you also grow closer to God.

Memorial and Arts Committee

Have you ever noticed that there is beauty everywhere inside and around Trinity Church? One of the main reasons why is that we have a committee dedicated to helping us maintain our buildings and furnish them tastefully and appropriately. The Memorial and Arts committee meets monthly with the Rector and Parish Administrator to discuss building and ministry needs. Decisions about style and décor originate in this committee and are sent to the vestry for approval on large projects. The most recent project of this committee is the renovation of the bathrooms near our chapel that is near completion. Another of the functions of the committee is making decisions about memorial gifts. When there is a death of a parishioner and memorial funds are given to the church, this committee works with the Rector and the family of the deceased to determine the best use of those funds. Many of the items used in our worship (vestments, altar hangings, linen, silver, and brass) have been memorial gifts through the years. There is a memorial book in the foyer in a display that holds the record of past memorial gifts. The current members of the committee are: Katherine Waddell, Jack Collins, Ashley Holt, and Johnny Cargill. We are grateful for the dedication of this committee, for the beauty of our church and its furnishings, and the memorial gifts given to the Glory of God and in memory of our dear loved ones.

Refugee Resettlement Project Underway Trinity Prepares to Welcome New Neighbors



This season, a group of dedicated Trinity volunteers are engaged in a major outreach effort to help resettle two separate immigrant families who are coming to the United States with refugee status to join relatives who are already here. While resettling in a new country can be a golden opportunity for a better life, it is also a major hardship. It involves mountains of paperwork and so many new things to learn, from the English language to rules of the road to cultural norms. Trinity's team of lead volunteers are applying their expertise to be ready to assist these families when they arrive and help them acclimate quickly to American society. In addition to disbursing government aid to the families, Trinity is collecting monetary donations, clothing, furniture and other basic necessities for these families. Trinity's volunteers will offer rides, logistical support, and a welcoming community to the refugees in their first 90 days of arrival, sometime this Spring. Is something that happens in church that has always made you wonder: why do we do this the way we do it? Immediately following 10:30 worship, **Sunday, February 25th**, both newcomers and longtime Trinity parishioners are invited to gather near the baptismal font for **Trinity 101**. In this short, 25-minute open forum, Trinity's clergy will facilitate a conversation and do their best to answer any and all questions related to the Episcopal church, the meaning of the liturgy, and the significance of the art and architecture that surrounds us on Sunday mornings.

Traditional Language During Lent

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

Don't let this call-and-response catch you off guard! Trinity has shifted from using our usual contemporary language liturgy, called "Rite II" in the Book of Common Prayer, to the traditional language liturgy, also known as "Rite I." There are many differences between Rites I and II beyond all the **thees**, **thys**, **and thous**. While both liturgies follow the same broad pattern, they each contain their own unique prayers and phrases that contribute to the rich heritage of our worship tradition. The Rite I Eucharistic prayer you'll now hear on Sundays at Trinity is as old as the Episcopal church, having been adapted for use in the United States from the Scottish Episcopal prayer book at the time of the consecration of Samuel Seabury, the first American bishop, in 1784.

To match the style of Rite I, Trinity is also reading its lessons from the King James Version of the Bible during Lent. While newer translations of the Bible prioritize advances in scholarship and modern clarity, the King James Bible, also known as the Authorized Version, is unparalleled for the beauty and dignity of its prose, and has withstood the test of time as one of the great contributions to the English language. While both Rite I and the King James Bible may take some getting used to, we hope they help Trinity to connect with its roots, to "ascribe to the Lord the glory due his Name" and to "worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness!" (Psalm 29)
