Dear friends,

A Trinity Tradition Continues to Grow

As pandemic restrictions waned late last year, Trinity was once again able to resume the Prayer Breakfast, opening our doors and inviting people off the streets to enjoy a hot meal and a cup of coffee on Sunday mornings at 7:30 a.m. Since then, the Breakfast has steadily grown, and we now serve about 30 guests each Sunday. Feeding the hungry is a timeless expression of the Gospel command to love one's neighbor, and the Prayer Breakfast is one way members of the parish can respond faithfully to the changing realities of our neighborhood, our city, and our country.

We anticipate that the demand for this ministry will continue to grow in the Fall, but right now the pool of volunteers who come at 7:30 on Sundays to fill trays and make coffee remains small. If you would like to become a regular or occasional volunteer at the Prayer Breakfast, now is a great time to get involved. This month, Trinity is trying out a new service of Morning Prayer on **Thursdays at 7:30 a.m.** Following the "Daily Office" reframes our hours and days, nurturing our faith and helping us on the spiritual journey. If you would like to start, resume, or deepen your habit of daily prayer, consider joining Father Andy for Morning Prayer on Thursdays this Fall.

What is the Daily Office? It's a pattern of worship laid out in the Book of Common Prayer (pages 75-135). This pattern was established in the 1500's by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer, compiler of the first prayer book. Cranmer took the liturgy of the hours that had been prayed in monasteries for centuries, and compressed this tradition down to a form that could be learned and said by all faithful people in the midst of their busy lives. The Daily Office consists of two primary services, called Morning and Evening Prayer, and two shorter offices, called Noonday prayer and Compline (night prayer). We already hold an Evening Prayer service on **Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m.**; now there will be a time to say Morning Prayer at Trinity as well.

Why say Morning Prayer? Taking a few minutes to center, to offer familiar prayers, and to hear the Word in Scripture is a great way to start your day! Plus, the Daily Office is a *spiritual* discipline. By learning the rhythm of Morning Prayer, you will deepen your connection to Anglican tradition and soak up the very best wisdom our prayer book has to offer. Whether we say it alone alone or in a group, Morning Prayer joins our personal prayers to the prayer of the whole church in a special way. We pray on behalf of the whole Body of Christ, using prayers that have been offered up by that Body for centuries, sometimes millenia. As we grow accustomed to the Daily Office, we believe that through its words, the Spirit will guide and shape us into the people of faith we are called to be.

How can I participate? Anyone is welcome to join Father Andy for Morning Prayer in-person at Trinity on Thursdays at 7:30 a.m. However, if you're not an early bird, or if your time in the morning is too limited for a trek to church, we're also trying out a simultaneous livestream of Morning Prayer via Zoom. At 7:30 on Thursdays, just log onto Zoom using the special link, and enter the password bcp1979. You can listen in while getting ready for your day, or grab a prayer book to follow along at home!

Acolyte Commissioning & Training Sunday, August 20th




