From the Rector

From the Rev. Timothy H. Graham, Rector

What does the church do to celebrate the New Year? While the rest of the world celebrates the beginning of a new year on January 1, the Church begins a new year with the first Sunday of Advent, four weeks before Christ-That Sunday is the beginning of our liturgical year and begins a four week season of waiting for the birth of our Savior. Following the four Sundays of Advent, we celebrate the season of Christmas. For us, Christis a season, and not just a day celebration. There are 12 days of Christmas, and they end on the Feast of the Epiphany, January 6. The Feast of the Epiphany marks the beginning of the season of Epiphany. Often characterized by a star and the arrival of the Magi, this season is about the showing forth or manifestation of Jesus. In this season we hear in scripture about the baptism of Jesus and t he time when his ministry is shown forth to the world.

On Ash Wednesday we begin the season of Lent, a 40 day penitential season in which we are invited to a time of prayer, fasting and self denial as we contemplate our Lord¹s passion. At the end of the season of Lent we arrive at Easter, the glorious feast of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Easter for us is a season that lasts for 50 days, ending at the Feast of Pentecost. On Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit, the

birthday of the church. Pentecost for us is also a season, the longest season of the church that makes up about half of the liturgical year. We also call this ordinary time, and in this ordinary time we hear scripture readings that invite us to deepen our faith. At the end of the Pentecost season is the feast of Christ the King, and then we arrive again where we began, at the season of Advent. Our liturgical year helps us stay grounded and throughout the year we learn about the birth, ministry, teachings, death and resurrection of Jesus, and also the gift of the Holy Spirit and the understanding of our faith. Our scripture readings on Sundays follow a three year cycle, and there are appointed ones for each Sunday of the liturgical year for three years. A few weeks ago at the beginning of Advent we started Year C of the Revised Common Lectionary. If you would like to look ahead and find the scripture readings appointed for any given Sunday, you can find them on this website: www.lectionarypage.net or you can take home a printed calendar that is available in our church office.

I look forward to walking through the liturgical year with you. Grace and Peace in Jesus Christ our Lord.

I grew up in a town just outside Seattle, Washington where I was the oldest of two boys. I competed nationally in speech and


