Month of March:

All students will receive communication via email from their Success and Career Advisor with information about preregistration.

Week of March 12th:

All students will receive communication via email from the Registrar's Office with their preregistration date and time.

April 6th - 16th:

Students will be able to pre-register for courses; Success and Career Advisors will work with all students after April 16th to confirm schedules for the Spring semester.

Here is what you need to do NOW to be as prepared as possible for Fall 2021 preregistration and secure your front seat:

- Look at your "Progress" tab in Student Planning to see which classes you still need to take to fulfill degree requirements.
- Check that your track / concentration, double Major, or Minor information is listed correctly. If you think something is missing, reach out to your Advisor ASAP, so they can address it prior to pre-registration.
- Check out your degree checklist and course sequence to get an idea of what you will need to take next semester. Need this? Reach out to your advisor!
- You can **add classes to your plan** in Student Planning – the courses will not yet have sections, days, or times linked to them, but adding them to your plan now will save time later when that information becomes available
- Clear any applicable holds you may have on your account with the appropriate office on campus. Ask your Advisor for clarification.

This month we're introducing a new column, in which one of our community members, students, faculty, or staff, shares a bit of their journey, how they got started on that path, what drives them, and what they're hoping to achieve - in short, their "Why".

In this inaugural installment, Dance senior Kaeley Cahill writes about her Dean journey and what's next.



As a Dean College student who was born and raised in Denver, Colorado, I am often asked, "what brought you all the way to Dean?" This question, for me, always has new answers. It gives me a moment to reflect on all of the great opportunities I have received, the amazing friends and faculty I have worked with, and all of the great memories that my Dean experience has consisted of.

But honestly, all of those "new answers" are what have kept me at Dean; the reason I chose Dean stems all the way back to before I had even arrived on campus. My close friend and Dean alumna, whom I had the pleasure of growing up dancing with, Bre Moland ('17), had suggested Dean would be a great fit for me. Bre loved her experience at Dean and I am so thankful she pushed me to apply.

I was looking for a program that was versatile and equally focused on all styles of dance. At Dean, I have never felt I had to give up my love for tap and jazz styles, and that was an important component for me in picking a college dance program. I also gravitated to Dean because of its smaller campus atmosphere but large dance population. At Dean, students in the arts programs make up a huge portion of the student body, and the arts programs are well respected and supported by the entire campus. Also, because of our relatively small classroom sizes, the entire faculty has had the ability to really get to know who I am, who I am working to become, and I have felt completely supported by them throughout all of my time here.

Whenever I am asked about the degree I am pursuing, I often receive that big, blank stare that immediately follows my response of being a dance major and psychology minor. People are often very confused as to why I chose the major I did, and never expect me to actually have a plan for what to do with that degree after school. I feel arts majors are often stereotyped for

choosing their majors, because art is typically viewed as a hobby and we don't actually have a plan for what we want our "real careers" to be yet. But if you ask me, arts majors are choosing not to have a "back-up plan" and know exactly what they plan to do, post-grad.

I am no exception. I've known dance needed to be a part of my life since I was a young kid, but it wasn't until I got to Dean that I knew exactly what I wanted to do with my degree in dance. Dean prepares you to be thinking of life after school as early as your freshman year. Dean opened my eyes to so many career possibilities and opportunities, which is how I was introduced to the world of Dance Movement Therapy. I've always had a passion for dance, working with kids, and helping others, but never knew how I could combine them in a career that I would truly love. By researching the field of Dance Movement Therapy and the career classes I've taken at Dean, I was able to use my coursework from my major and extracurricular activities to gain the knowledge and skills I needed to make my passions and dreams a reality.

Following graduation in May 2021, I will be moving back home to Colorado. I will be attending Naropa University to complete my Master's degree in Somatic Counseling with a concentration in Dance Movement Therapy. Through continuing my education as a dance major at Dean, I am fully prepared to pursue this next journey and begin to change the world one dance step at a time.

LAUNCHING A SUCCESSFUL CRUISE LINE CAREER

When I was offered the opportunity to travel the world, save money to go towards student loans, and receive a consistent salary performing Broadway style production numbers, I knew it was something I could not pass up.

Like all my prior professional jobs, working for a cruise line began with an audition. Norwegian Cruise Lines' audition was rigorous, lengthy, and technically challenging. I attended an open call in Orlando, FL, along with 250 other female dancers. Within a very short span, all of us were taught a stylized, upbeat, and very technical dance combination. Tricks and lines executed on both sides of the body and in heels. After the first round of cuts, the remaining dancers were taught a much different style routine from a show currently being staged. Remember me when I say this, "Versatile dancers get hired".

By the end of an extremely long day, what had been 250 dancers ended up being 20-30. I remember Robert Dean Hertenstein, VP of casting, dismissing all of us but saying that if anyone wanted to try the singing portion, they were more than welcome to stay. I am not a singer. I mean, I whisper in groups when happy birthday is sung because I have that little training. As I was packing up my dance bag to leave, he personally came over to me and asked, "You don't sing?" I replied without hesitation, "No, but I'll learn if you want me to". I sang Happy Birthday, not having anything else ready or planned, and the rest is history.

My very first contract was on *The Pride of America*, sailing around Hawaiian Islands, and for all shows I was fully mic-ed and singing. I now recognize the chance I was given, and how Hertenstein sought me out. Most casting directors will neither care, nor take that time. As I tell my dancers constantly: make sure you do it all! And if you do not do it all that well, fake it!

Rehearsals in Tampa, FL, lasted about 6 weeks and multiple casts rehearse at the same time. Norwegian Cruise Lines put their casts up in apartment-style hotels and shuttle them back and forth to training. Days and weeks are long and exhausting: rehearsals ran from roughly 8am-7pm, every day but Sunday. My body was bruised and sore, pushed past any endurance training I had ever experienced. For another contract I was flown to Toronto for a month to train in Aerial gymnastics for their Cirque Du Soleil show and my hands bled for weeks, due to the rope burns. While hard in the moment, I left with new skills like silks, Spanish web, lyra and bungee.

From the rehearsal process you are flown directly out to board your ship, wherever in the world your home port is. Living on a ship is not for everyone, but I thrived in this environment. I loved its convenience and all of things it had to offer. We could use the guest gym, steam room, and running track. We were able to dine at all restaurants on board as well as visit all the guest bars and clubs. I loved to run around the track as the sun set over the ocean or rent bikes and explore the islands. Norwegian organized a lot of crew activities and opportunities to meet people from different departments. With Skype and porting in the United States once a week during my Central American contract, I still felt connected to my friends and family.

There is usually a mid-contract slump, when it can become easy to just watch movies in your room and nap all day. It's important to set goals and keep yourself motivated. Financially, it was a huge blessing. When I returned from my last contract, I was able to focus on training and auditions because I had built enough 'cushion' to support myself until I booked my next job. I also bought my first car, and, when the time came, I had enough saved to buy my first home with my husband.

Shows were three to four days a week, with two performances per night. We also had weekly rehearsals and cleanings, bi-weekly weigh-ins (costumes cannot be taken in or out after you set sail so it is very important to maintain your hired measurements), not to mention gym training time (which had to be logged), re-block rehearsals when a cast member was sick and/or injured, and other ship duties. Performers had plenty of free time and the sightseeing I got to do over my years with the company is something most people will never experience in their lifetimes. With Norwegian, I traveled to Asia, South America, Europe, and Africa, seeing and visiting over 13 countries outside of the United States. Experiencing other cultures and learning about other people was certainly the best part of the job.

I had to end my time with the company due to a severe knee injury. Although I was devastated to hang up my performing shoes, I am so thankful to have stayed in touch with the people who made my time with the company so memorable. Over the years I have and continue to create choreography for auditions for them, whenever they are in the area. The cruise industry is massive, launching dozens of gigantic, new ships every year and with more Broadway shows being taught to casts. For ocean liner staff, that means even more excited guests who want the best possible experience.

If you are looking to travel the world and make great money, there isn't another path I would recommend more. Although at times rigorous and tiring, to me it was worth every step I took along the way to get there, including that song, "Happy Birthday."
