Momentum Gathers for a Classical Christian School at St. Philip's

The Rev. Jeff Miller's special announcement and teaching on Sunday, May 5, were particularly exciting for those of us at St. Philip's who have spent the last several years discussing, praying, hoping, and planning for a classical Christian school that is dedicated to raising up students as ambassadors of Christ steeped in traditional and classical learning.

Our journey began in the summer of 2021, when several St. Philippians attended a conference of a national association of classical Christian schools to learn more about this growing movement. They also toured the very successful Holy Trinity Classical Christian School in Beaufort, which opened its doors in 2012 under the direction of Jeff Miller, then the Rector of the Parish Church of St. Helena.

As the list of interested parishioners and friends grew to almost thirty, we held a meeting in April of 2022, and all who attended expressed serious interest in pursuing a new school. This informal group then invited the Rev. Chad Lawrence, founding headmaster of Holy Trinity Classical Christian School, to give a day of teaching at St. Philip's. Inspired by Chad's teaching, an ad hoc planning committee and a prayer committee were formed in the summer of 2022.

These informal efforts paused that fall, when a discernment committee began its process of discerning the Shine the Light campaign's priorities as well as a new outreach ministry to be funded by the campaign. The committee unanimously recommended to the Vestry that St. Philip's first restore its historic campus, which supports all current ministries, and then pursue a new ministry: establishing a classical Christian school. The Vestry unanimously accepted that recommendation.

When the Shine the Light campaign got underway in 2023, the focus was on the campus restoration phase, but prayers and continued preliminary planning for the school quietly proceeded, and the informal group of interested parishioners and friends continued to grow to over sixty people. More and more parents and grandparents expressed the critical need for additional educational opportunities in Charleston with genuine excitement for the classical Christian model.

This spring, as the first phase of the Shine the Light campaign exceeded 80% of its goal, the Vestry enthusiastically and unanimously moved forward with planning for a school, soon appointing the Classical Christian School Planning Committee for the purpose of planning a classical Christian school as a ministry of the parish. The first classrooms are to be located in the State Street office building at the corner of Cumberland Street, with the goal of beginning classes as soon as possible with the Lord's leading. The Committee was tasked with making regular reports and recommendations to the Vestry.

The Committee held its first meeting on May 2 and began discussing various planning topics. The Committee plans to meet monthly and will form working groups of committee members and other interested parishioners to study, discuss, and make recommendations to the Vestry on the many issues that need to be addressed before a school can open.

Members of the Classical Christian School Planning Committee are very excited about the work ahead and are prayerfully optimistic that the critical Phase I Campaign goal of \$16.4 million will soon be completed. St. Philip's is now at \$14.3 million of that goal.

Once Phase I is completed, Phase II can get underway and funds can be raised and pledged specifically for the school and the necessary State Street renovations. We believe that if Phase I of the Shine the Light Campaign could be completed this summer, then the school could open as soon as August of 2025, likely beginning with kindergarten and early elementary grades and then adding a grade a year as the school grows.

We encourage all St. Philippians to make a prayerful and generous pledge to the Shine the Light Campaign so that momentum for the Classical Christian School can boldly build and the doors of the school can be opened for the children of our parish and community. We are grateful for all who have encouraged and supported this vision.

God at Work in Uganda

Jayne and Tom Gurley, Tammy and Guv Gottshalk, Shaun Gillis, MD (Bozeman, MT), and Jean Chamberlain Froese, MD (Toronto, Canada), and I arrived in Mukono, Uganda, at midnight on Saturday, April 20. We stayed in guest quarters at Uganda Christian University (UCU), awakening on Sunday morning to a gentle rain. We made our way to a modern open-air pavilion on campus to attend an Anglican church service; we could hear the student choir and praise band as we began our walk there. We were greeted warmly by the congregants, pastors, and the Vice-Chancellor and his wife. We knew we were in for an exciting week, embraced by the Ugandans who love Christ and proudly profess their faith.

On Monday, our group divided between participation in the Save the Mothers program, which focuses on reducing fatalities during birth through prenatal care and education, and meetings with students and department heads at UCU. The business school, agriculture department, and members of the Alumni Association were among those we met. Each program offered at UCU teaches not only the course material, but how God works through each individual. During our tour of the UCU campus, we were struck by seeing each building emblazoned with a Scripture verse as a testimony to their mission as a Christian university.

Tammy, Guv, and I spent a day at the Water Mission headquarters in Jinja, including a trip to "the bush," where Water Mission has installed its high-tech water system for the community. To say we were impressed would be an understatement. Tammy and Guv were asked to lead a church service at a school in the community, where we suddenly found ourselves surrounded by 850 adults and children. Fortunately, we were accompanied by a young lady with Water Mission who served as our translator! After the service, we joined a local pastor to visit two families in the bush. The pastor read from his Bible, and Tammy prayed for the families. This day made a lasting impression on all of us: seeing Jesus at work!

The joy of the love of Christ flowed through the people of Uganda that we encountered. The worship was exuberant; one could not resist being caught up in the wave of pure expression of glorifying Jesus and gratitude for His overwhelming love and many blessings. Despite extreme poverty and want, the people were ecstatic with enthusiasm for the Lord Christ. It was inspiring, especially for us who live in abundance with such comparative wealth. What an example of a deep contentment resulting from trust in the Lord.

On our last day in Uganda, we attended the Ugandan Anglican Church in Entebbe, and again, we were warmly greeted. The choir was joyful as they sang hymns in English and the local language. The message by the guest speaker was loud and clear: God chose you! You did not choose Him. The congregation enthusiastically embraced her words. As we left the church that day, I saw a car in the parking lot with a license plate on its front bumper that read "PSALM 117."

We have returned inspired and with a better understanding of the work God is doing in Uganda. He touched our lives there, and it is obvious that the Ugandans feel His presence there every day.
