

SVOSH An-Najah Conducts Vision Screening for Orphaned Children

The SVOSH chapter at An-Najah National University in Palestine recently organized a three-day vision screening campaign at a local school for orphaned children.

Optometry students provided free eye exams for children from first grade through high school, focusing on the early detection of vision problems. Those needing further care were referred to the university's optometry clinics, and students who required corrective lenses received free, donated spectacles.

Dr. Ithar Beshtawi, Head of the Optometry Department and SVOSH Chapter Advisor, noted that the project allowed students to enhance their clinical experience while serving the community.



The school administration expressed heartfelt appreciation for the team's efforts, commending the campaign's role in improving eye health and supporting the education of these children.

Ruaa, Chair of the Optometry Students Association, shared one memorable case from the campaign involving a fourth-grade girl diagnosed with high myopia.

The child had been struggling to see the board at school and was thought to be inattentive. After receiving her first pair of glasses, her reaction was immediate and joyful, and her teacher later reported a marked improvement in her classroom participation. Ruaa noted that this experience deeply moved the student volunteers, highlighting the life-changing effect that vision care can have on a child's education and confidence.
