Meet Alison Costanza

This month's Employee Spotlight showcases the Northwest region's Assistant Branch Archivist, Alison Costanza.

What is your role at the State Archives?

As Assistant Branch Archivist at the Northwest Regional Branch, I assist people in finding records that fit their research needs, and also accession, catalog and prepare records for use by researchers, assist with outreach activities, such as tours and workshops, and assist the Branch Manager with supervising volunteers and student employees, and with coordinating work on the building.

Do you have any tips on how to efficiently search the Archives?

Use the keyword search feature of the online catalog to learn about available records, then start a conversation with an archivist about your research project.
