A bouquet of spring books

After the winter—and the year—we’ve had, what could be better than to feast your eyes on these fascinating, thrilling, heart-breaking, illuminating books? Available except as noted.

* An unforgettable 13-year-old girl propels Chris Whitaker’s stunning novel, **We Begin at the End**. This riveting, dark, emotion-charged thriller centers on a police chief who never really grew up and a girl who never had a childhood, as they each pursue their respective quests to solve the murder of someone they love. Duchess Day Radley is a self-proclaimed “outlaw” whose devotion to protecting her little brother is ferocious, and whose grit, strength, and vulnerability are the light that illuminates this story, and often breaks your heart. At once a murder mystery, a love story, and a tragedy, this superb thriller ends with the blessing of hope. \$27.99

* **Come Fly the World** by Julia Cooke is a breezy but engrossing account of Pan American Airways in its heyday, interwoven with the engaging stories of several longtime flight attendants whose lives intersected as they sought adventure and a chance to see the world at a time of severely limited options for women. This well-researched look into a gritty and glamorous era in air travel is both entertaining and revelatory. \$28

* A young Puritan woman plots her escape from a violent marriage in the mesmerizing **Hour of the Witch**, the latest novel from Chris Bohjalian. When Mary shocks her community and risks her life to file for divorce in 1662 Boston, her compelling claims of her husband’s cruelty are countered by charges of witchcraft against her. Now she must fight to escape

not only her marriage, but also the gallows. Fascinating, fast-paced historical fiction that will have you on the edge of your seat. April \$27.95

* In Kaitlyn Greenidge’s novel **Libertie**—inspired by the life of one of the first Black female doctors in America—Libertie, a freeborn Black girl in Reconstruction-era Brooklyn, knows her physician mother expects her to go to medical school and join her practice. But Libertie is drawn more to music than science and yearns for something else. When a young Haitian man proposes marriage and assures her that she will be his equal on the island, she accepts, only to discover that she is still dominated by him and other men. Seeking to parse what freedom actually means for a Black woman, Libertie struggles with where she might find it—for herself and for generations to come. 26.95

* An international bestseller, **The Phone Booth at the Edge of the World** by Laura Imai Messina, tells a story about grief, mourning, and survival, inspired by a real phone booth in Japan with its disconnected “wind” phone, a place of pilgrimage and solace since the 2011 tsunami. When Yui, who lost her mother and daughter in that disaster, hears about the phone booth, where the grieving go to speak to their lost loved ones, she too makes the pilgrimage. But she cannot bring herself to speak; instead she finds Takeshi, a bereaved husband whose daughter has stopped talking since her mother’s death. Heartbreaking but heartwarming, this beautifully written book points to the healing that can come after terrible loss. \$25

* ***The Song of Achilles***, Madeline Miller. This wonderful retelling of the legend of Achilles and the siege of Troy is exciting, romantic, and utterly heartbreaking, with an ending that is deeply satisfying. Perfect for anyone who loves Homer and anyone who loves a thrilling story. Alexandra \$16.99

* ***The Wife Upstairs***, Rachel Hawkins. Take Jane, newly arrived in Birmingham, Ala., add Eddie Rochester, a recently widowed charmer, and mix in Jane's mysterious past and Bea Rochester's mysterious death,

and one has a page-turning novel, as well as a love triangle with a twist—suspense at its best. Lil \$27.99

* ***The Great Alone***, Kristin Hannah. Desperate and anguished from living in the “real world,” a Vietnam ex-POW moves his family to an isolated outpost in Alaska, facing harsh conditions and no modern conveniences. But the real danger comes from within the family. Ellen \$17.99

* ***Sparks Like Stars***, Nadia Hashimi. I was swept away by this tragic, yet uplifting story of a successful Afghan-American woman who is haunted by her past. She returns to Kabul to learn exactly what happened to her family the night she escaped a brutal coup and assassination. This engrossing tale of her travels and search will capture readers to the very end. Janet \$27.99

* ***Ghosted***, Rosie Walsh. Sarah and Eddie meet by chance and fall deeply in love. They spend a week together and both think they found their forever, but destiny changes everything, or so it seems. A romantic suspense story, something light to read and distract us from this challenging time. I became totally immersed in the story. Tina \$16

* ***A Promised Land***, Barack Obama. A dense, intimate self-portrait of exploration into the president's life as well as his insights, motivations, and self-criticisms, which illuminates the decency, humanity, and difficulties he faced. * ***Red Lotus***, Chris Bohjalian. I love reading Bohjalian's books! This story is set in Vietnam and involves a bicycle journey with many twists and turns, love, deceit, murder, and pandemic. A great read. Vicki \$16.95

* ***The Vanishing Half***, Brit Bennett. A rich, immersive story about light-skinned black identical twin girls who grow up in a light-skinned black community in Louisiana. As very young girls, their lives

are forever altered when they witness the lynching of their beloved father. As they grow into adulthood, they choose different paths and each must learn how to live with the decisions they've made. * **Caution! Road Signs Ahead**, Toni Buzzco, Chi Birmingham. This hefty board book presents 35 road and highway signs in cleverly shaped pages with one-sentence descriptions. The perfect book for the little ones in the back seat! 2-4 \$17.99

* **Birds of a Feather**, Sita Singh, Stephanie Fizer Coleman. Mo has always felt different. Unlike the other peacocks with their beautiful, bold green and blue feathers, Mo's feathers are white. But when a storm threatens, Mo must stand tall and shake his tail feathers—as only he can—to help his friends.
