

## New Victims of Crime Act Grant: Free Psychotherapy for Rural Victims of Crime



The Victims of Crime Treatment Center at the University of Nevada, Reno is pleased to announce the expansion of our **free services** to victims of crime throughout rural Nevada. We are now offering a selection of assessment and psychotherapy services to adults, children, and parents via a secure telehealth system. The telehealth system means that you do not have to travel to take advantage of these services. Instead, you can utilize our clinic from the comfort of your own home. This makes our clinic accessible and safe, even during the current COVID-19 crisis.

### AVAILABLE SERVICES

#### For Children

We provide thorough assessment, evaluation, and psychotherapy for children who have been sexually or physically abused. Treatment for children emphasizes the collaboration and involvement of non-offending parents.

#### For Parents

We provide psychotherapy and support services for non-offending parents of abused children.

#### For Adults

We provide thorough assessment, evaluation, and psychotherapy for adults who have been sexually abused as children and/or sexually assaulted as adults.

### Who Qualifies?

Victims of child abuse, child sexual abuse, child neglect, and adult sexual assault all can be seen for free through our clinic. A police report **does not** have to have been filed to qualify for our services.
