A Reading from the First Book of Samuel (1:4-20)

On the day when Elkanah sacrificed, he would give portions to his wife Peninnah and to all her sons and daughters; but to Hannah he gave a double portion, because he loved her, though the Lord had closed her womb. Her rival used to provoke her severely, to irritate her, because the Lord had closed her womb. So it went on year by year; as often

as she went up to the house of the Lord, she used to provoke her. Therefore Hannah wept and would not eat. Her husband Elkanah said to her, “Hannah, why do you weep? Why do you not eat? Why is your heart sad? Am I not more to you than ten sons?”

After they had eaten and drunk at Shiloh, Hannah rose and presented herself before the Lord. Now Eli the priest was sitting on the seat beside the doorpost of the temple of the Lord. She was deeply distressed and prayed to the Lord, and wept bitterly. She made this vow: “O Lord of hosts, if only you will look on the misery of your servant, and remember me, and not forget your servant, but will give to your servant a male child, then I will set him before you as a nazirite until the day of his death. He shall drink neither wine nor intoxicants, and no razor shall touch his head.”

As she continued praying before the Lord, Eli observed her mouth. Hannah was praying silently; only her lips moved, but her voice was not heard; therefore Eli thought she was drunk. So Eli said to her, “How long will you make a drunken spectacle of yourself? Put away your wine.” But Hannah answered, “No, my lord, I am a woman deeply troubled; I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but I have been pouring out my soul before the Lord. Do not regard your servant as a worthless woman, for I have been speaking out of my great anxiety and vexation all this time.” Then Eli answered, “Go in peace; the God of Israel grant the petition you have made to him.” And she said, “Let your servant find favor in your sight.” Then the woman went to her quarters, ate and drank with her husband, and her countenance was sad no longer.

They rose early in the morning and worshiped before the Lord; then they went back to their house at Ramah. Elkanah knew his wife Hannah, and the Lord remembered her. In due time Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, “I have asked him of the Lord.”

Hannah prayed and said, “My heart exults in the Lord; my strength is exalted in my God.

My mouth derides my enemies, because I rejoice in my victory.

A Reading from the Book of Hebrews (10:11-14, 19-25)

Every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, “he sat down at the right hand of God,” and since then has been waiting “until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet.” For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified.

Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh), and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

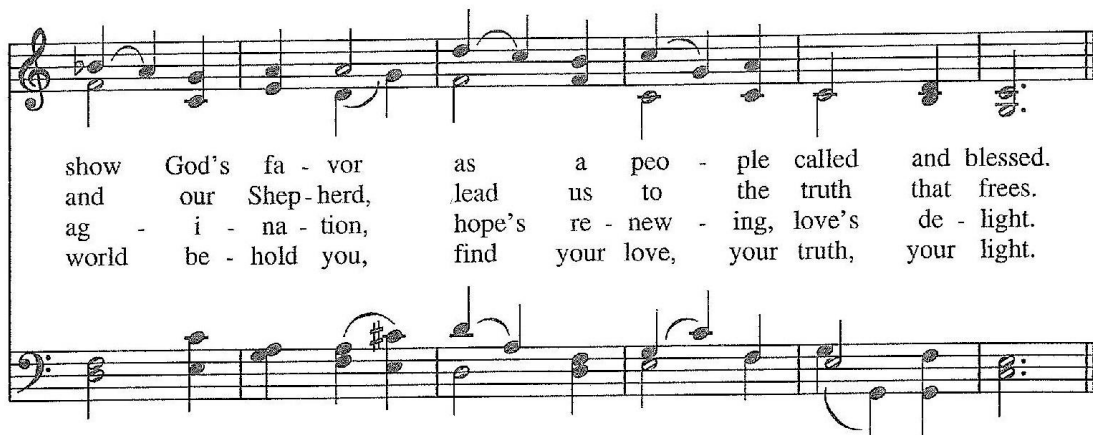

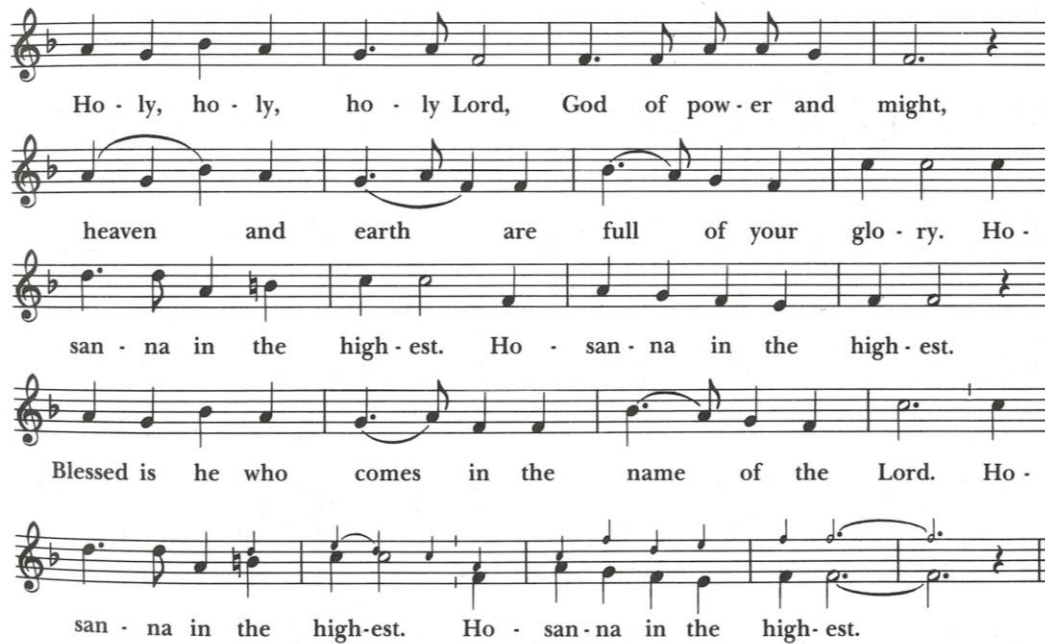

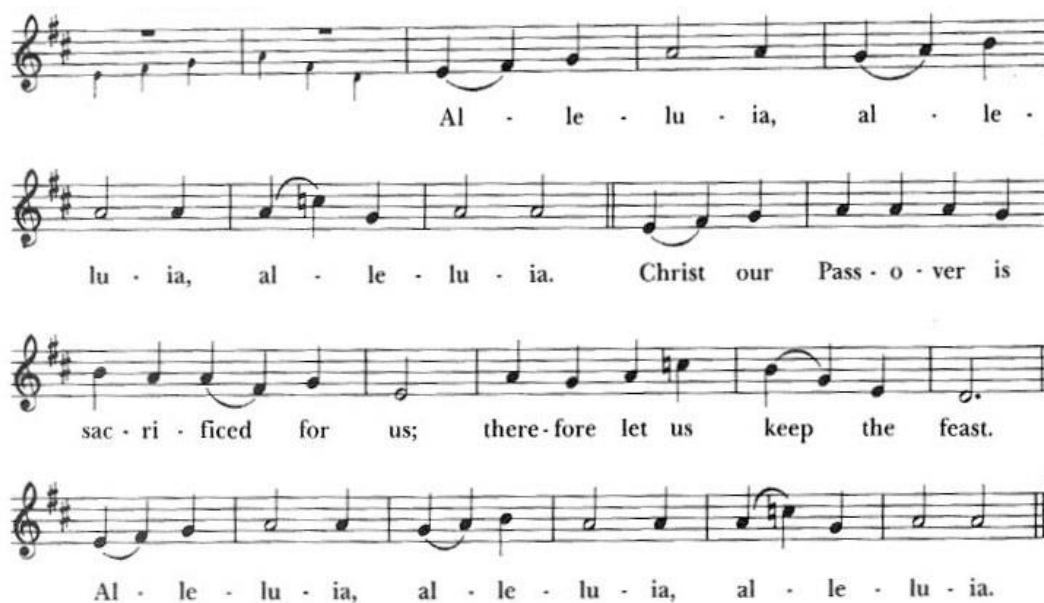

Angel Gift Program

It's time once again for the Angel Gift Program sponsored by the Outer Banks Woman's Club! Families and children are selected by Dare County Social Services and referred to the Woman's Club as needing assistance. This year, All Saints has 15 children of all ages to provide gifts for. There are clothing choices and gift requests for most children, but those 9 and above are given gift cards by the Woman's Club so that they can choose clothing for themselves. In those cases, there are only gift requests, some of which are gift cards from local stores or for particular items.

In May, St. Andrews Outreach adopted a Honduran family who is officially seeking asylum in the US. Because they are officially seeking asylum, they do not receive any help from the government. They reside in Kill Devil Hills and need our help. The family consists of a father and his 8 year old daughter (Nassar and Abigail). They are both learning English. Nassar has a full time job that is weather

dependent. Abigail is enrolled in Elementary School. They have been assigned a social worker who helps navigate the school system, make and keep appointments and with parenting.

Nassar's only form of transportation is a moped. His only relative in the county is a distant cousin who helped him find a place to live and set up utilities. Nassar is learning to put together healthier meals for Abigail especially since she underwent dental surgery last week. Our support will continue to include a home cooked meal on Sundays. An outreach committee member will take the meal to the family each Sunday after church.
