Ramona and Allen Ehrhardt will be taking the supplies as they travel to the reservation to work at an eye clinic for the Lions of Wisconsin.

Fall is the time of year we are reminded to prayerfully make our pledges to our local congregations. It is also the time for PW at all levels, to prayerfully consider supporting PW programming and staff. We, beginning with our congregational PW giving, support the mission of the PC(USA), the PW staff in Louisville (providing the many resources aiding all programming assisting the Global Exchange and the USA Experiences. Most recently, through the sponsorship of PW in the presbytery of Milwaukee, a grant was presented to *Exploit No More* to assist sexually exploited girls in the Milwaukee area. Marilyn was able to field many questions and to thank those who have supported PDA in the past through their donations, and also to those who joined reconstruction teams to the golf states following Hurricane Katrina.

PW continues to support PDA, not only financially through the One Great Hour of Sharing Offerings, but also through the donation of Gifts of the Heart kits (hygiene, school, and clean-up bucket kits).

Lydia Neshangwe, an International Peacemaker from Zimbabwe, is an ordained minister of the United Presbyterian Church in Southern Africa, (UPCSA), a transitional Presbyterian denomination with churches in South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

She was a delightful speaker and it was so interesting to learn about life in Zimbabwe including the women and their care of their children while multitasking working in the fields. She shared how a child is secured on their mothers back while she is working in the fields and hauling wood and water.

She and her friends receive unclaimed slipper-socks (with the gripper soles) from local hospitals. These are then washed and given to local shelters. These socks come in a variety of sizes and could be given to shelters for women and children as well as to men's shelters.

PWP Milwaukee Coordinating Team Meeting

Members of your coordinating team met for lunch and business in Greendale on Wed. Oct. 30. Those attending voted to support the mission of Lydia Neshangwe, International Peacemaker. While visiting Milwaukee Presbytery, Lydia was guest speaker at Apostle Church. Details of that day are found elsewhere in this newsletter. A gift of \$100 will be donated to Lydia's mission by the PWP of Milwaukee. She and her pastor husband are making a significant difference in the lives of many in their community.
