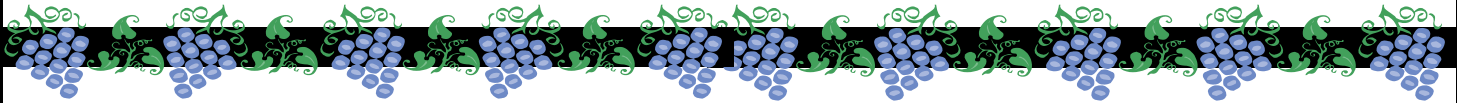

### THIRTY YEARS OF PW



Thirty years ago PW was born. It was not born without its share of birthing and labor pain as women from the northern and southern churches met to determine a new course for the women of the about to be united Presbyterian churches.

The book *Bound Together in Love, the creation of Presbyterian Women 1978-1988*, by Barbara McDonald chronicles the struggles of many hours and months of prayerful consideration that went into the creation of PW. Each tradition had to let go of valued practices and meld others together to create a viable, workable member of the newly formed denomination.

The northern women had collected Thank offerings, the southern women, the Birthday offering. The southern women had sent delegations on trips to other areas to learn of the struggles of women in that area. They also had been offering lifetime memberships with pins.

As the two churches merged, synod and presbytery boundaries were redefined. PW would abide by these changes. A whole new language needed to be created for PW - terms like gatherings rather than presbyterials. How was PW to be funded? A new logo and PW purpose were to be created. A new magazine was to be published. What staff would be needed to provide leadership, and how was this staff to be financed. What structure needed to be in place for all churches, presbyteries and synods to be represented, to provide and receive leadership and materials?

We are the beneficiaries of the committed, devoted women who donated, not just hours but years, to the formation of PW as we know it today. We give thanks for their insight and service.

The 2018 Thank Offering provides an opportunity to express joyfully our gratitude for God’s blessings by sharing with those in need at home and around the world. Your

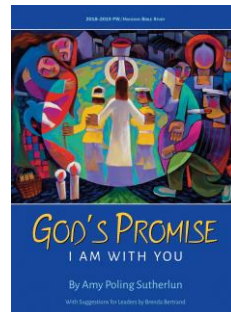

## EQUALITY IS OUT – EQUITY IS IN

Equity was a term used and heard frequently at the Churchwide Gathering. According to Webster:

*equality* – the state of being equal, being neither superior nor inferior  
*equity* – justice, impartiality

Are we looking for racial equality, or racial justice? As I understand the difference, equality means you are equal to someone or something else – racially, that usually means equal to the dominant white in our society. If we speak of equal housing, or equal education, we usually compare them to that provided by or for the dominant members of our society. Equity means being honored or of value in your own right.

Our scriptures tell us we are all children of God; not valued as man or woman, master or slave, tall or short. ALL are children of God. We do not judge the foods we eat by their ethnicity. Is Italian cooking, Chinese, French, Mexican judged against each other? Each stands on its own. So it should be with our value of one another.

It is not enough to understand this difference, we must take action. Action may be as simple as voicing our concern when others speak of equality as being enough. Let your light shine on the understanding of those around you. And be aware of and open to the use of the term EQUITY.

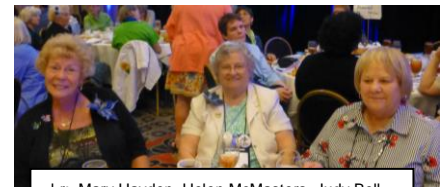

Arise, Shine, Your light has come! (from Isaiah 60:1) This verse was the inspiration for the 2018 Churchwide Gathering of the Presbyterian Women, which Ruth Meylink and Ann Peck attended Aug.2-5th in Louisville, KY.

They participated in a Louisville Mission Tour, visiting Kentucky Refugees Ministries which provides resettlement services from job placement to citizenship classes, providing continuing support. They also visited Hope Community Garden. Here resettled refugees and new American families received garden plots, along with environmental education and agricultural training.

Each day began with everyone coming together for lively singing, worship, and an interpretation of God's Word. Inspirational speakers focused on faith nurturing and waking to the fullness of the gospel. The speaker Friday helped everyone explore what it means to shine in our homes and



community. Marisol Jimenez gave an impassioned message on "your light" and a call to work for justice and peace. Ruth and Ann attended educational workshops and visited the global marketplace. While Ann went to a book discussion, Ruth stepped out for a Justice and Peace March to witness against segregation and racism in Louisville. To celebrate the 30th Anniversary of the gathering, women attending the final dinner dressed in outfits of the last 30 years. New officers were installed, communion was celebrated, and the women of faith, of justice, and of love left the gathering full of the spirit.

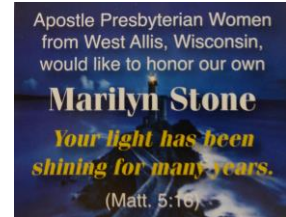
