### Why Latin?

At schools like Saint Mary, studies in Latin begin in kindergarten. Research shows that learning a second language boosts problem-solving, critical thinking, and listening—plus, it improves memory and concentration. Here's how Latin paves the way for future academic and career success:

#### Stronger Analytical Skills:

The logical structure of Latin provides the perfect framework to train the brain to think analytically.

#### Better Communicators:

More than half of English vocabulary is derived from Latin roots and 90 percent of English words longer than two syllables are Latin-based. Students with a strong background in Latin are effective communicators—a skill in high demand by employers today.

**Higher SAT Scores:** Studies show that students who study Latin for two or more years can score 140-160 points higher on the SAT than their peers.

## Did You Know?

Many professions incorporate Latin vocabulary in the workplace. From medicine to law and science, Latin words help to organize and define complex topics. Students who have a strong working knowledge of Latin in elementary and high school have a head start when studying to become doctors, lawyers, and scientists.
