Special needs planning encompasses a range of strategies, including establishing estate plans to fund special needs trusts, guardianship, and exploring alternatives like supported decision-making agreements. Upon reaching the age of emancipation at 18 years, an individual is presumed to be legally competent.

Considerations of promoting self-determination, autonomy, and skill development are to be balanced with concerns about a variety of risks faced in making important decisions. We work with our clients to explore a variety of decision-making options that range on a continuum from least restrictive to most restrictive, including supported decision-making agreements, durable powers of attorney, health care proxies, and guardianship. Part of special needs planning is understanding the resources, services, and supports that exist at the state, federal and local level and the process for accessing and maximizing those benefits. We provide advocacy for clients to establish, maintain, and maximize service plans.
