Protecting Your Business Online: Website Cloning Response Kit

Quick-Action Checklist

- Confirm and document the cloned site
- Use WHOIS lookup to identify host/registrar
- Submit takedown requests
- Report to search engines and Canadian authorities
- Notify your web host and clients
- Register popular domain variants
- Monitor with suggested tools

Step-by-Step Guide to Responding

1. Document the Cloning

- Capture screenshots and record the domain name.
- o Compare it with your legitimate site to identify copied content.

2. Submit a Takedown Request to the Hosting Provider

- o Use WHOIS lookup (e.g., https://lookup.icann.org) to identify the host.
- Contact the hosting provider directly with the included template.

3. Contact the Domain Registrar

- Use the registrar's abuse form or email.
- o Provide evidence of trademark/copyright infringement.

4. Report the Clone Site to Search Engines

5. Inform Your Audience

Use the included message template to warn clients of fraudulent activity.

6. Consider Legal Action

o If damage is significant, consult a lawyer who specializes in IP or cybercrime.

Sample Takedown Request: Hosting Provider

Subject: Urgent Takedown Request - Cloned Website Hosting Infringement

Dear [Hosting Provider],

My name is [Your Name], and I am the owner/operator of the legitimate website [www.yoursite.ca]. A fraudulent copy of our website is being hosted at [fraudulent-url.com], which violates our intellectual property rights.

Please find attached:

- Screenshots showing the copied content
- Our site ownership details
- A WHOIS record showing your platform is hosting the clone

We respectfully request that this fraudulent website be taken down immediately under your abuse policy.

Sample Takedown Request: Domain Registrar

Subject: Request to Suspend Fraudulent Domain - Cloned Website

This is a clear case of copyright and potential trademark infringement. Please suspend this domain or take appropriate action under your abuse policies.
