- Virginia native, Carter G. Woodson, founded the first Negro History Week in 1926.
- It was timed in February to coincide with Abraham Lincoln's and Fredrick Douglass's birthdays.
- It wasn't until 1976 that President Ford extended the observation to a full month to honor the contributions of Black Americans (NAAMHC <u>website</u>).

Jason Reynolds is a New York Times bestselling author of poetry and fiction for young adults. In addition to his Newbery, Printz, and Edgar Awards, he was named as the Library of Congress' national ambassador for young people's literature in January 2020. Dr. Ibram X. Kendri thought him the perfect person to "remix" his book, *Stamped From the Beginning*, to reach a wider audience. After years of coaxing, Reynolds finally agreed, creating an "impressive and much-needed" book that draws a line from the first European slave traders to today's Black Lives Matter movement.
