This interactive SPICE course will focus on internet safety, diving into different problems encountered online. We will learn about social engineering, cyber scams, and other bad actors who commit identity theft and fraud on the internet. We will discuss new technologies and threats using Artificial Intelligence (AI) including internet trolls, deep fakes, and red flags to identify threats, and lastly, how to stay safe and protect yourself online.

One Short Document, One Long Debate: Israeli Declaration of Independence and the Ongoing Debate Over Israeli Core Values

The importance of a declaration of independence for culture and society is well known. The importance of the Declaration of Independence for the State of Israel is much more significant and existential. The Declaration has even greater significant legal importance to a state which does not have a constitution. The Declaration of Independence of the State of Israel also has significant importance to Jews around the world. The Declaration was written under enormous political and military pressure. This document declared the fulfillment of the dream of the Jewish People against all odds.

The Document is short, but its modern liberal values are underongoing attack during the last decade. The debate about its ties with the Jewish religion is older than its ink. Its morals and meaning for the identity of Israelis are in constant tension.

In this mini course, we will take a look behind the scenes at the historical moment of the Declaration of Independence in 1948 as well as its impact on Israel today. We will read, watch and discuss the narrative of the declaration. We will dive deeper into the 'beauty and the beast' of this document and why it matters more than ever.

Rabbi Ofer Sabath Beit-Halachmi, according to rumor, is a descendent of King David. Although, without red hair or any other proof, you can find his creative liturgy in various reform prayer books and his children are all named after the dynasty. Ofer has a graduate degree in Talmud and Jewish Education. He served as a rabbi in Congregation "Shir-Chadash" outside of Jerusalem. Rabbi Ofer co-developed the "Aspaklaria" methodology of using the arts for Jewish education and community building. Workshop for Taking Better Photos Using Your iPhone

This will be a combination of lecture and hands on workshop with your phone. The goal is to have you be more comfortable and confident taking photos anyplace and anytime. Enrollment will be limited to 25 people.

Week One: We will work on getting you familiar with your picture taking instrument. You will bring you phone with you. We will take pictures of each other and identify what controls you have on your phone. We will discuss how low light can create dark, noisy, or blurry picture.

<u>Week Two:</u> We will work on looking at the light in the area you are going to take pictures to determine what your choices are in using the existing light to take pictures. Also, we will review how to share photos with the highest possible quality via email or text message.

<u>Week Three:</u> We will share our pictures that we have taken over the past two weeks and show what tools can be used to improve them- primarily using the tools in your phone.

<u>Week Four:</u> This session will explore the questions that you have at this stage of your picture taking experience. Anything is fair game during this time. We could explore things like: after taking pictures, what do you do with them? How do you organize them? Understanding why pictures that are printed on to paper look different than when you look at them on your phone. More sophisticated tools for working on your photos will be shared.

Richard Milner has had an active interest in photography since he was eight years old. He has worked as a professional photographer, held all the roles in film and video production, as well as been a producer of patient health education media for over 40 years.

He has participated in the evolution of photography from film -processed and printed in a darkroom —to the digital age-- where images are displayed on phones, tablets, and computers. His current interests include sharing his images with others as well as shooting and producing videos.

The Road to Revolution: America 1763-1775

In 1763 colonists across British North America could not have been prouder to be members of the British Empire. Fighting shoulder to shoulder with redcoat soldiers, the colonists had trounced their mutual enemies in the French and Indian War. In towns and cities across America, colonists toasted King George, his ministers, and his military. In New York City, grateful colonists erected a statute to their great king, a testament to the belief that their future lay with him.

On July 9, 1776, a crowd of American soldiers and sailors tore down this same statue, and melted down its precious lead into 42,088 musket balls to fire at the king's army. The two sides were now at war—delegates in Philadelphia had finalized the Declaration of Independence just five days earlier—and that war would rage for the next seven years.

In this five-week course, University of Maryland historian Richard Bell explores the tumultuous thirteen years between 1763 and 1776. These weekly sessions will examine four of the extraordinary events that turned thirteen loyal British colonies into a united confederation willing to go to war to achieve independence.

Richard Bell, Ph.D. is Professor of History at the University of Maryland and author of the book Stolen: Five Free Boys Kidnapped into Slavery and their Astonishing Odyssey Home which was a finalist for the George Washington Prize and the Harriet Tubman Prize. He has held major research fellowships at Yale, Cambridge, and the Library of Congress and is the recipient of the National Endowment of the Humanities Public Scholar award and the 2021 Andrew Carnegie Fellowship. He serves as a Trustee of the Maryland Center for History and Culture and as a fellow of the Royal Historical Society.

This course will explore the history of anti-Semitism in western society through an examination of some of the historical texts upon which it is based. We will trace the history of anti-Semitic writings from the ancient world, including Rome and the church, through modern writings up to the rise in anti-Semitism today especially in the Middle East, in Europe and in America. Topics/content to be included: Anti-Semitism in the Christian Bible and the Church fathers. Islamic texts. Martin Luther and medieval European anti-Semitism. Nationalism, racism and Naziism. Anti-Semitism today: KKK, White Nationalism, anti-Israel.

Rabbi Floyd Herman is one of the Rabbi Emeriti of Har Sinai-Oheb Shalom Congregation. He served as the Rabbi at Har Sinai Congregation for more than 35 years. He continues his involvement in our newly merged congregation and in the community. He also enjoys golf and food. Rabbi Herman has taught before in our SPICE program on several occasions.
