#### **Lectio Divina**

Lectio Divina (literally divine reading) is a personal reflection and sharing of a short Bible verse. The group will pray, reflect and share what resonates personally and spiritually. Perfect for Lent! We'll meet virtually for one hour.

#### **Study Group: "Where We Begin: The Butler Family Tomb"**

Fanny Kemble, an acclaimed British actor, was married at Christ Church to Pierce Mease Butler in 1834. Butler was the grandson of Major Pierce Butler, who was a South Carolina delegate to the Constitutional Convention, the owner of hundreds of slaves, and a member of Christ Church. Major Pierce Butler and grandson Pierce Mease Butler are buried in the Butler tomb in the church garden. In 1859 Pierce Mease Butler, who inherited his grandfather's plantations, held the largest slave auction in U.S. history; the African American community called it "the weeping time." The study group is part of a larger program within our congregation as we work toward a reconciling response to the history that the tomb represents. One of the entry points to that process is a journal that Fanny Kemble Butler published in 1863 about her visit to the plantations; the journal became an important abolitionist document.

**Timetable:** Online meetings every other Wednesday, starting April 7.

The conveners will organize materials and lead the discussion. Participants are welcome to purchase or order these books from a library or bookstore if desired.

**Materials:** A reading packet will be assembled for each participant, to include the following:

- *Major Butler's Legacy*: Chapters 1 & 2, bio of Major Pierce Butler. 30 pages.
- *The Weeping Time*: C. 1, The Weeping Time (p 3 – 20); C. 2, The Auction and American History (p 21 – 33); C. 6, Faith on the Butler Estates (p 80-93). About 40 pages of text.
- *Fanny Kemble's Journal*: C. 4, Exploring Butler Island/ 54-73; C. 5, Further Explorations (the infirmary)/ 74-88; C. 6, Observations upon Mr. Butler's Slaves/ 89-105; C. 10, Psyche/ 132-140; C. 11, Shadrach's Death and Funeral/ 141-150; C. 19, Women in Slavery / 214-231; C. 29, Christ Church/ 307-315. Focus on Kemble's encounters with the enslaved people on the plantations. About 100 pages of text.

**Resources:** excerpts from three books; a short newspaper article about the 160th commemoration of the auction; a review of a memorial site; and an optional film.
