Easy Rules for Power Point

On each slide

- Three to four points, issues or written items, no more
- Two to three photos , no more
- Use a simple background with a few exceptions to this rule
- No more than a total of 5 or 6 of the top three items

A simple message with colorful photos to help get your message across. Again white space around everything, no color background. Simple white background will show well on your screen or if you must use a wall instead of a screen for your power point. These will all work.

No more than three to four bullet
points on each slide



- The back of the room must be able
to read your presentation
- Keep points as short as possible
- No jargon, you don't know what the
audience knows

No more than two or three photos



To many photos makes it hard for the viewers to see any of the photos

The photos must be clear & clean, the best you have

Color photos are a must except when showing historical items or themes

Crop photos where needed

Use color whenever possible

When using black & white make sure the photos are very sharp & clear

No matter how much you like a photo if it is mashed, or unclear it does not belong in a power point presentation

To many photos are as bad as not enough photos

Don't get too fancy with the effects you can do to photos: once or twice is enough in one presentation unless it is very subtle

Watch the clip art: you don't want it to look old fashion & out of date

Use Branding or our logo whenever possible: this is important to our Clubs & organization

Use Branding : so the public knows who you are .

Don't have dots on part of a page & not on other parts of the same page: make them all the same size too.

Notice how cramped these 2 pages look.

How bad they looked filled to the brim with writing. These 2 pages are a great example of what a bad power point would look like.

How you as the reader do not want to read this to the end. This stuff is important!



Rules for Presenters



- ♦ Do not read the slides: your viewers can read
- ♦ Do not use a laser pointer: generally it can not be seen
- ♦ Avoid excessive animations: the movements are often time distracting to the viewer
- ♦ Proof it, Test it, Proof it & Test it again: just to make sure it works & the spelling is correct
- ♦ Make sure people in the back of the room can see the whole picture frame; why put something in a slide if no one can see it
- ♦ Make sure the print is large enough for the back of the room: if the viewer can't read it why bother at all
- ♦ Don't use a bunch of different fonts: the font can unify the presentation
 - ♦ Make sure the whole picture frame fits the screen that you are using to show it on
 - ♦ Make sure your presentation is formatted to fit the page: people notice
 - ♦ Do not use more than one or two photos of the
