The Collect

Mary Stewart, a Colorado school principal, wrote the words to the Collect in 1904 as a personal daily prayer. Mary titled her poem

"A Collect for Club Women" when it was first published because she felt it might have special appeal to clubwomen. According to Mary, "The first women's organization to hear or use the Collect or to print it in its year books and biennial reports was the General Federation of Women's Clubs."

During GFWC President Dorothy Houghton's administration (1950-1952), the American Home Department published Mary's history along with an interpretation of the text and suggestions for using it in GFWC programs. The words for the Collect are as follows:

Keep us, oh God, from pettiness; let us be large in thought, in word, in deed. Let us be done with fault-finding And leave off self-seeking. May we put away all pretense And meet each other face to face, Without self-pity and without prejudice. May we never be hasty in judgment and always generous. Let us take time for all things; make us to grow calm, serene, gentle. Teach us to put into action our better impulses, straightforward and unafraid. Grant that we may realize it is The little things that create differences, That in the big things of life we are at one. And may we strive to touch and to know The great, common human heart of us all, And, oh Lord God, let us forget not To be kind!

In 1889 to celebrate the 21st anniversary of the Sorosis Club of New Year City, a Call was sent out to 97 Women's Clubs to meet for a Convention on March 18,19, & 20th 1890.

61 clubs responded by either sending delegates or letters.

The First GFWC Emblem was called the Raising Sun. As you can see from this photo the pin was lovely. Here is an other quote directly from JC Croly's bookthe History of Women's Clubs. "Mrs. Croly & Mrs. Brown had already chosen blue as the Federation color; the dawn, with the sun's rays, as the symbol, & 'Unity in Diversity' as the motto. Our principal effort was to obtain a design, & put it into a form that would be good...yet within the reach of every club woman."

"What is the advantage of the pin? Well, it is a symbol, & therefore stands for an idea – the comprehensive idea of its motto. It emphasizes our intellectual and spiritual kinship with other club women, & excites a feeling which in time deepens & becomes permanent." (page 135)

This second emblem was approved in 1920. The design shows a crusader' shields coming out of darkness meaning enlightenment coming from the blackness of the back ground. The rings round the words stand for eternity. The 3 colors of the shield are red for our courage, white for our purity and blue is constancy.
