- 1. Be mental health care providers (i.e. therapists, psychologists, case managers, or social workers).
- 2. Have at least 2-3 years of experience in providing mental health care to unaccompanied Central-American children seeking-asylum in the U.S.
- 3. Be currently working in Oakland or San Francisco.
- 4. Spanish-speaking providers are encouraged to participate.

Participation is voluntary and confidential. This study is NOT affiliated in any way with the U.S. government.

### THIS STUDY INVOLVES ONLY ONE INTERVIEW WITH EACH PARTICIPANT

The interview may take up to two hours and will be conducted online due to the current COVID-19 Crisis.
