We're at a special time of the year, these days around the Autumnal Equinox, when the hours of the day and night are equal. In the Celtic calendar, this is the second of three harvest festivals, and it is a time to recognize the bounty of the harvest. We reflect on what may have been learned in the long, warm, and light days of the summer. We feel and express deep gratitude. It is also a time for assessing one's life; a time for

granting forgiveness, especially if there is a debt that the debtor can never fully repay; and a time to pull together one's energy to take care of the tasks that must be completed before the cold winter months.

The "Irish" in me has always been tempered by the Catholicism of my mother's family; but the Celtic pagan in me sees beyond the church to look into nature: into the woods where I may walk and wonder, especially as the leaves are falling. I collect a few of these leaves and decorate inside my apartment. Touching the leaves reminds me of the great carbon cycle which sustains life on this planet.

And I go to the sea where I think of the passage so many people took to arrive on this continent; the sea, a place of memory and heartbreak, of power and challenge, a roadway of human connection. I go to the ocean's edge and touch the sea which is the greatest thing I may touch on this earth: one water, part of one cycle of evaporation and condensation, of rain and rivulet and return.

This autumnal time of reflection calls us together as a congregation to be that place of respectful relationship where we may have compassion and make repair. I look forward to our time with Aisha Hauser on October 4 when all of us are invited to gather to grow in our capacity to build a compassionate life together. Perhaps we'll recognize bounty and gratitude and our deep interconnections.

I'll share a Celtic prayer that even a humanist like me can enjoy for its intention. I listen for my ancestors and their hope for the

RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS TEAM (RRT) Paul Carbone, Chair

Hi fellow congregants and friends! I am writing on behalf of the Respectful Relationships Team (RRT), to provide final details about our Workshop on Saturday, October 4, 2025, to be led by Aisha Hauser, MSW, Lead Ministry Team of the Church of the Larger Fellowship and past President of the Liberal Religious Educators Association.

These free workshops are meant to continue the work that we did together as the RRT in a "Meeting the Moment" workshop in February, and our sessions with Aisha in March and May. We hope to deepen our understanding of communicating empathy and move into two additional areas: having difficult conversations and moving toward repair.

Below is the Workshop meeting scheduled for Saturday, October 4, in the Art Gallery:

Noon-ish Simple lunch 1:00 PM Workshop II Conclude by 3:00 PM

Workshop I: How to Have Difficult Conversations.

Learning to manage conflict is part of navigating tensions. As a society, we have not handled conflict well, and instead, people choose sides and dig in their heels. This workshop is less about moving anyone to any side; rather, skills are learned to encourage clear communication so people feel heard, and a shared reality can be identified. This process also shows that this is uncomfortable, and learning to sit with discomfort is also part of the process.

Workshop II: Moving Toward Repair.

This workshop combines the lessons from the above and ties it all together. Participants will take part in creating a model that people in the congregation can look to for how to engage with interpersonal challenges. This part is crucial to support shifting congregational culture to one of people having the resources and skills to intervene in the moment when one or more people are showing up in ways that cause harm. The goal is that this intervention is one that maintains the dignity of all involved.

UUCSR Congratulates and Honors Their Music Director



On August 26, 2025, UUCSR Music Director Stephen Michael Smith was announced as the national winner of The American Prize 2025 (the Vytautas Marijosius Memorial Award) for his work with The Orchestra at Shelter Rock. This prestigious award is given in recognition of excellence in the presentation of creative and significant programming of the orchestral music repertoire.



The American Prize is the nation's most comprehensive series of contests in the classical arts and is designed to evaluate, recognize, and reward the best performers, ensembles, composers, directors, and administrators in the United States. Its panel of distinguished national leaders in music has considered thousands of qualified contestants from all fifty states since its founding in 2010 and has awarded nearly \$150,000 in prizes in all categories.

Stephen Michael Smith has served as Music Director of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Shelter Rock in Manhasset since 1999, where he founded The Orchestra at Shelter Rock in 2006. Entering his 22nd season as Music Director of the Danbury Community Orchestra, he recently completed a 14-year tenure as Music Director with the Symphonic Pops Orchestra of Long Island.

Maestro Smith was chosen twice to participate in the International Northern Baltic Festival in St. Petersburg, Russia, and has performed in Italy, France, the Czech Republic, Poland, and the former Yugoslavia. During his tenures as Music Director/Conductor of the Shrewsbury Chorale and the Dalton Alumni Chorale, he prepared both institutions for their Carnegie Hall debuts with New York Grand Opera. A champion of new works, he has premiered numerous major works for choral and orchestra and has appeared on PBS with Jim Cotter's Articulate.

A graduate of Bennington College (Marcellus Hartley Dodge Scholar), Mr. Smith studied conducting with Vincent LaSelva at The Juilliard School. He has taught at the University of Hawaii, Hartwick College, and the American Academy of Music. He previously held the positions of Executive Director of the San Francisco Opera Guild, Development Director of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, and Interim Director of the Merola Opera Program at San Francisco Opera.



We are hoping to expand the program with the Social Justice Committee so young people can work on social justice issues grounded in Unitarian Universalist values. These three students are particularly interested in climate justice. Hear directly from them on what they learned:

Nailah Islam

Being a Social Justice intern at UUCSR this summer was such an unforgettable experience. As I have entered my sophomore year in high school, I understand that it is crucial to develop skills that can be used in the real world, and working alongside my mentor has introduced me to a work environment that I had never been exposed to thus far. The welcoming environment at UUCSR has allowed me to form many connections with so many talented people. This opportunity has been significant in that it has helped me deepen my passion for social justice and has allowed me to expand on that interest, making real change in issues that matter. I am very grateful that I was offered the chance to be an intern at UUCSR and value everything that I have learned during my time there.

The Social Justice internship at UUCSR was a wonderful experience in which I learned the power of taking action, even if it may seem small, to promote social justice, I gained new skills, and made new connections. We wanted to help the immigrant communities affected by ICE raids and inform them of their rights. Therefore, UUCSR made cards that state those rights and we laminated them. Furthermore, we discussed climate justice and created a poster raising awareness of it. Working with Sonia and the other interns toward the same goals was inspiring and reinforced the value of teamwork.

In the future, I want to broaden my experience in social justice by learning more about different issues faced in our communities and focusing on specific projects, such as climate justice. I plan to deepen my knowledge about climate justice issues and contribute to addressing them. This internship has inspired me to pursue more opportunities where I can work with others, strengthen my advocacy skills, and take part in creating a more just world.

For three Tuesdays this summer, I, along with two fellow passionate and engaged young people, had the opportunity to experience and participate in an aspect of UUCSR that is not readily accessible to those of my age each Sunday. We volunteered as Social Justice Interns with the UUCSR Social Justice Coordinator, Sonia Arora. As many *Quest* readers may know, I was drawn to this because I have a particular passion for women's rights, as my generation is coming of age in a world where we see our freedoms stripped and find our peers seemingly inexorably divided. Therefore, I aspire to become an active member of an intergenerational community working to address these systemic issues and trends and facilitate a society strengthened by love, knowledge, and equity. For these reasons, I feel very lucky to be a part (and future member) of a spiritual organization that also has a social justice branch. Joining this small group of like-minded individuals this summer, I began to see a path towards my future involvement in this initiative.

In this short time, I learned about the diversity of potential avenues for change, the initiatives continually in operation at UUCSR, and our role in long and short-term change, both locally and nationally. In the future, I would like to continue my involvement in this area and my collaboration with UUCSR Social Justice team, as it is vital in this society for young people, who will inherit this divided and troubled world, to learn how to change it for the better. I am involved in environmental advocacy in my home community, and I would like to continue this through a year-round initiative advocating for and working towards climate justice, as protecting our planetary oasis is of the utmost importance to me and to many. I intend to do this through a likely youth collaboration at UUCSR to promote the maintenance of our meadow (to be constructed in the Spring), while fostering the leadership skills and immersive experience for this larger group of my peers that are necessary for us to become the engaged citizens that we desire to be and that this world deserves. I hope to pursue science in my future, but I will always maintain my commitment to pursuing a more just world, as it is our duty as a species to seek the best version of ourselves that we can be, and I see that in the missions of social justice.

ABBA (Able Body of Believers Alliance) begins its 20th year of providing backpacks filled with school supplies for less fortunate





Without a proper education, these students remain in an intergenerational poverty spiral. Bookbags and school supplies are an investment in helping future generations of children break the cycle of poverty.




