

Celebrating Indigenous People's
Sunday: "Water is Life" When
communities of Native American
people began protesting the Dakota
Access Pipeline nearly ten years
ago, their concerns were for not
only the drinking water supply of
the Standing Rock Sioux nation,
but for their cultural heritage and
self-determination. They saw the

protection of waters as a sacred act. Our congregation sees itself as a steward of the aquifer under the land that is our home. We'll consider this morning how our actions express our compassion for the earth itself as well as those peoples who have previously inhabited this land. We'll look for connections among these stories, even as we see connections through the water which covers the whole earth.

# **TOUCHSTONES**Rev. Dr. Natalie Fenimore



As we consider the theme of "Cultivating Compassion" this October, I was reminded of the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly in 2011, where the Ware Lecture was given by the former Catholic nun, religious scholar, and author, Karen Armstrong. After the lecture, I stood in a fairly long line to get a signed copy of her book, *Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life*.

In her lecture and book, Armstrong asked us to take these twelve steps:

- 1. Learn about compassion
- 2. Look at your own world
- 3. Have compassion for yourself
- 4. Embrace empathy
- 5. Practice mindfulness
- 6. Take action
- 7. Consider how little we know
- 8. Think about how we should speak to others
- 9. Have concern for everybody
- 10. Seek knowledge
- 11. Give recognition
- 12. Love your enemies

And we can begin by wishing for a better world. Understanding, in Armstrong's words, that, "All faiths insist that compassion is the true test of spirituality and that it brings us into relation with the transcendence we call God, Brahman, Nirvana, or Dao. Each has formulated its own version of what is sometimes called the Golden Rule, 'Do not treat others as you would not like them to treat you,' or in its more positive form, 'Always treat others as you would want to be treated yourself."

In her 2011 book, Armstrong writes about the need for compassion because of the imbalance of power and wealth, wars which we seem unable to end or win, and environmental catastrophe. In 2025, we still find ourselves with these painful challenges. Finding our steps—and these are not easy steps—to compassion can be a way of beginning to meet these challenges and to bring about a better world.

## Introducing Third Fridays—with Rev. David Carl Olson "Living a Public Life"—Begins Friday, October 17

UU Minister Rev. Chris Buice created a prayer in the style of the famous Prayer of St. Francis that draws on the recently adopted statement on UU Values:

Make us instruments of your peace.

Where there is indifference may we bring justice.
Where there is selfishness may we bring equity.
Where there is stagnation may we bring transformation.
Where there is homogeneity may we bring pluralism.
Where there is isolation may we bring interdependence.
Where there is greed may we bring generosity.
And where there is hatred may we bring love.

Make us instruments of your peace with love at the center of everything we do.

In social media posts, in newspaper columns, and in TED talks—and even in pastoral conversations with ministers—people are sharing a deep sense of isolation and loneliness. This experience contradicts an article of our faith, that we are people of interdependence, and live lives of profound interconnection.

"Living a Public Life" will be a monthly series of workshops on building our interdependence to live our values in the public sphere. We will learn to do one-to-one relational meetings, talk about the diverse cultures we inhabit, and discern the difference between the private lives of our families and the public life of a congregation like Shelter Rock.

Tex Sample, in his book, *Micro Practices for Justice Ministry*, speaks of interconnectedness. "This kind of mutuality builds an ethos—establishes healthy, faithful practices—and opens the door for emergent events of another and higher order." ### **Transitioning Into Autumn**

The weather is rollercoastering and transitioning into the next season. Asters and goldenrods are blooming, grasses are flowering, and leaves are shifting into their autumn hues.

A native shrub that is particularly attractive this time of year is smooth sumac, *Rhus glabra*. With its unique leaning habit and wonky stems, who wouldn't take a second look? And have you seen its dusty pink stems with two-foot-long leaves? The epithet "glabra" refers to its smooth, non-hairy stems. Smooth sumac is found throughout the US, often in sunny, disturbed areas such as forest edges and open fields. It suckers to form colonies,



making it a great plant for soil and embankment stabilization, and is frequently used in restoration projects.

Smooth sumac is food for quail, pheasants, wild turkeys, and many songbirds. It is a nectar source for pollinators and a larval host for the red-banded hairstreak butterfly. The plant is used by Indigenous Peoples for its medicinal properties as dermatological, gynecological, and respiratory aids. Ethnobotanically, it is used for ink extracted from the leaves, as well as a paper and textile pigment made from the woody stem.



Look for smooth sumac along the edge of our forest; the most color-changing stand is across from the Chapel entrance. The shrubs are enclosed within a fence to prevent deer and rabbit browsing; the new growth is tasty to these woodland animals! As the plants become established, the enclosures will be removed.






