

Ellington: Back and Better than Ever

The sun is high above our heads. The sharp green grass, soft beneath our feet. In all its proud glory, is Duke Ellington School of the Arts. Strong, white pillars distinguish the school from its counterparts. But these superficial things are not what makes Duke Ellington stand out.

What Principal Sandi Logan says makes Ellington stand out is the community. The fact that everyone has made the sacrifice to be here. "That means that there is a different type of love and community that other communities don't have."

That much is true. The last school year was marked by high tensions between the administration and students. Outside media intensified these tensions, but this year? False information and misguided energy are out.

Last year, as Logan said, was an experiment. Straight back from the pandemic, nothing was clear. It was an evaluation of what could and could not happen post-shutdown (the pandemic isn't over). But, she says very proudly, "We know how to navigate the barriers. We know how to adapt."

Ongoing negotiations with DCPS for our school's independence have brought our community strife- but it has also made us reconcile with who we are.

"You think you know everything until those things are threatened," she says, fresh from a meeting.

This year is all about defining what it means to be at Ellington. What ground Duke Ellington stands on. What our community cares about. What we can do to uplift that community. This process of negotiation has helped us re-establish our identity.

As Duke Ellington comes upon its fiftieth anniversary in 2024- it's important to know what we want to take into the next fifty years. Is its toxicity? Is it fighting? Most would disagree. It's the artistry, the passion, the pushing ourselves to the edge for the sake of our passions, that we want to take with us.

So this year, there's plenty to look forward to.

Already, in the first half of this year, we have DC Music Summit- a three-day weekend for music industry participants, run by a Duke Ellington Alum- Dior Ashley Brown.

March For The Arts, a fundraiser run by the Theatre Department, will remind us that the effort to keep the school well funded goes beyond negotiation with DCPS, but working with our community.

The inaugural Ellington Homecoming, "For The Love Of Duke" will kick off this November 3rd-6th, and will feature a student variety show.

We're also kicking off a variety of clubs this year- GSA, Book Club, Cheerleading, Photography, and more!

In the second half of the year, we're bringing back Arts as Activism, which began last year.

International Food and Games day is also expected to come back. It will connect the Ellington community with what it means to be an artist outside of the United States.

This year is about building upon old Ellington traditions, and also, creating new ones.

It gets colder, now. The sun is beginning to set earlier and earlier, and intense rehearsals are beginning across all departments. As summer fades away, one thing is certain; Ellington's spirit won't.

Ms. Robinnnn, I know TDP is always busy, but what can we expect from them this year?






