<b>Pre-Meeting Workshop A</b> 12:30pm – 4:30pm	<p><b>Workshop A: Invasive Species, Pesticides Recertification “Integrated Pest Management and a Framework of Response to Address the Threat of Invasive Species in the Forest Setting”</b> <i>Ari Giller-Leinwohl, Terrestrial Invasive Species Manager, Adirondack Park Invasive Plant Program (APIPP); and Kristofer Williams, Director of the Capital Region Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (CR-PRISM)</i></p> <p>Together Ari and Kristopher will outline Integrated Pest Management practices as a framework of response to prevent and control the harmful spread of invasive species. The program is geared toward conservation managers seeking to update their best management practices for field work. Topics will address the threat of invasive species, a framework of response using a tier designation and conservation values, Integrated Pest Management Practices by mode and method will also be explored using product recommendations for terrestrial invasive species and forest pest. A portion of the program will review High Threat Invasive Forest Pest of Concern. Take-home resources will be provided. General Session 3 9am – 10:15am	<b>General Session 3: Working toward Restoration of Threatened Native Hardwoods:</b> <b>American chestnut, beech, elm, and more.</b> <i>Dr. Andrew Newhouse, SUNY ESF; Sophia Suriano, Graduate Student at SUNY ESF; and Madi Montalvo, Research Technician at SUNY ESF</i> <b>Moderator Timothy Yeatts</b> Chestnut blight is often a textbook example of the destruction to forests that can be caused by an introduced pathogen. In recent decades, many other prominent tree species have also

	<p>succumbed to pests and diseases, and the list of threatened trees continues to grow. Our biotechnology research team at ESF has developed an American chestnut tree with enhanced blight tolerance, which is being tested in various restoration scenarios. We are now applying our experience with chestnut toward other threatened species, including American elm (Elm Yellows) and American beech (Beech Leaf Disease). This work offers much-needed hope at a time when we often hear more about emerging problems than success stories.
