As they work tirelessly to support their families may they be showered with Your blessings. Give mothers and fathers strength to exercise compassion as they live each day under Your care. May those who are joined in Your love, support mothers and fathers by their promise of spirit and devotion to prayer. Amen."

LETTER FROM PASTOR DON

An autumn drive down a country road introduces us to something "terrifying without danger" – the scarecrow. In cornfield and garden patch, in the "lower forty" and the backyard, these un-unionized security guards

watchfully work around the clock. They do no eat, drink, or complain about the weather. They require no holiday, no pension, no perks, no pay.

Scarecrows are content to wear farmer Bob's cast-offs or farmer Bertha's hand-me-downs. Unlike mannequins that appear to have a supply of fashionable clothes for all seasons, scarecrows, happily following Jesus' instructions, keep their wardrobes to a minimum.

If you ever have occasion to undress a scarecrow, you will discover that every scarecrow's skeleton is a <u>cross</u>. In fields they take their stand leaning on the everlasting arms. When west winds tatter the clothes that hang upon the one who hangs in the garden, when winter frosts sag head, flap arms, twist legs, the imaginative eye "at times can see the very dying form of One who suffered there for me."

All of us have scarecrows in our lives – harmless things that somehow scare us all life long. In abstract society we call them <u>phobias</u>, but in concrete terms they are <u>scarecrows</u>. Although scarecrows would not hurt a crow, we build up fearful images of creatures made of straw. Terrified without danger, some people see bridges as scarecrows. They will not cross a bridge for love or money! Other people may see elevators as scarecrows: such individuals climb twenty flights of stairs on a hot day rather than ride with the scarecrow.

A healing exercise would be for such individuals to get together and talk about the scarecrows in their lives. I don't believe it is true that to kill a werewolf you have to drive a wooden stake through its heart. However, I do know that to get rid of the scarecrows running and ruining our lives, we must expose them for the harmless critters they are. In <u>The Wizard of Oz</u>, "Scarecrow" confides... "There is one thing in the world I'm afraid of... a lighted match."

While St. George is said to have slain the dragon all by himself, none of us <u>alone</u> can banish the scarecrows from our lives. A healing, supportive community is what's needed to exorcise scarecrows from our minds and put them out to pasture. We may even want to give this experience and opportunity a name: Scarecrow Therapy. Such "therapy" can be as simple as gathering together people of faith as caring individuals who band together to put an end to panic without substance and terror without danger.

September might be a good month for a Scarecrow Sunday to be observed. Maybe we could have a contest and give the creator of the best entry a chance to put his or her scarecrow to work. Make the scarecrow a scapegoat: lay all our fears on it, and let the prize-winner take it away to a place where winter's winds will disperse those fears forever.

Scarecrows are imaginative art forms made in our own image. They are made to scare crows and delight people. Let's get them out of their hiding places in our minds where they are terrorizing us, and put them where they rightfully belong – out in our fields and gardens supposedly scaring crows.

Just a brief update to keep everyone posted on the current activities of the Church Development Team. As you know, we are working on improvement opportunities for our church Narthex focused on "The Visitor's Experience." Our goal is to make our Narthex a space that better facilitates the transition from the secular world to a place of worship and also to make it a more welcoming space.

Activities currently underway by several sub-teams include:

- Creating the one missing banner for Ordinary Time/Trinity and providing lighting for all banners displayed in the Narthex. We have the final design for the banner and plans for creating it and obtaining a formal proposal are currently being explored.
- Establishing a better sign-up process and location for sign-ups for various congregational activities and related support. We have received suggestions from key users of current sign-up sheets and are working on final plans for providing an improved sign-up center.
- Recruiting and working with ushers that includes dealing with health and safety issues. Suggestions have been obtained from current ushers and information folders are available for those who could not attend either of two meetings. • By now you have noticed some seating and supplemental lighting placed in the 4th Street "nook" areas of the Narthex. We have received many favorable comments on those minor additions.
