Center for New Americans seeks a part-time Development & Marketing Associate to support the organization's fundraising and online marketing efforts. Primary responsibilities include donor research with a focus on individuals; designing and implementing appeals to businesses and individuals; marketing and public relations, with a focus on social media. Responsibilities also may include assistance with the preparation of funding proposals, and with planning and implementing events. The position is 20 hours/week.

Required qualifications include experience in development and marketing for non-profit organizations; experience with individual solicitation; proficiency with technology, including social media and donor software; strong oral and written communication skills; strong organizational skills, including a system for follow-up and donor management. Preferred qualifications include an ability to work flexible hours, including some evenings and weekends as needed; experience working with immigrants, and a commitment to immigrant services.
