Jim Ayres from Community Foundation of Western Mass:

- COVID-19 fund from CFWM is new and growing. The fund that we are running has been able to raise \$3.2M so far. Trying to do two key things:
 - Pushing out grants to organizations on the front line. (In a break with past funding, CFWM is not using an application process for this.)
 - Addressing the needs of those who are most vulnerable in the community and most impacted by inequity over time.
- First stage is front line work to assist organizations right now. Next stage is recovery phase. Among emerging issues, this will focus on the financial impact on organizations during this time.
 - Organizations also need help with revenue challenges because there are new, often challenging, circumstances and so many fundraising events have been canceled.

Jeff Harness from Cooley Dickinson Health Care:

- As well prepared as possible for anticipated needs and increasing both bed and ICU capacity.
 - ICU capacity is close to 30 and there are beds available.
- Call center is getting calls about masks and
- CDHC will act as a hub for locally made fabric masks.
 - Will accept, wash, and distribute masks to shelters, programs, etc.
 - They can use several thousand more.
 - Do it yourself mask group on Facebook is the biggest group around here. John Bidwell will connect Jeff with them.
- Getting a lot of calls also from people with symptoms and can triage these with nurse.
- Can phone the Call Center to be matched with primary care provider if you don't have one.
- Some increased ability for COVID-19 testing.
 - Call your primary care doctor first and you will need an appointment for a drive thru set up.
 - MUST have appointment. 75 people per day currently being tested there.
- CEO Joanne Marqusee will be at Northampton City Council on Thursday.

Francine Rodriguez:

Some providers struggling with undocumented immigrant families.

- How to find funds to help them? Any thoughts about this?
- John Bidwell asks if there are needs beyond funding.
 - Amherst Survival Center and Northampton are meeting food needs.
 - But currently no way to pay rent or electric bills. Right now, services will not be terminated. Concern is there is no money coming in to these families. Many have lost jobs.
- Jim says Pioneer Valley Workers Fund is about \$50K. Is this for any individuals without documentation or members of the PV group? Working to find that out.
- A note that CFWM funds are specifically for orgs and not direct to individuals.
- Center for New Americans does work with some undocumented immigrants.
 - There are some restaurant worker grants available.

Prity Shah:

- 3 undocumented families really struggling with rent.
- Looking at how to access grants for that.
- People have reached out in chat with info.

Mary McClintock:

- How is everyone doing on selfcare? A boost to see everyone here on the call.
- Little treats can make a difference.

- Important to find some time to breathe.

Do people have positive stories to share from their own lives or from their organizations?
Anything working well or that people are happy to see?

Geoff shares story about new cot shelter at Northampton High School. Originally looking for 50-60 volunteers a few weeks ago. This week, a friend who has been volunteering at Interfaith Cot Shelter said he could not get an available slot to volunteer at new High School Shelter. So many people want to help that there was not a current volunteer opening.

Mary shares that a month ago she did not know how to create a web page. Now she has built the COVID-19 page and is adding constant updates. Thanks to all who contribute information and keep this live and filled with fresh information!

John Bidwell says he is inspired by people's willingness to meet across common boundaries. Easthampton Community Center is serving people from 22 different communities. Robin Bialecki has been taking in 20-30 families a day. Huge testimony to her and just one example of what organizations are doing to help people in a completely new environment. It's been amazing to see that from so many agencies.

Jen Gallant from UMass Amherst Community Campaign:

- Raised a record \$483,000 this year!
- Thanks to United Way of Hampshire County working remotely, the first checks to nonprofits were mailed this week!
- Very grateful to donors and to organizations for moving these funds to meet needs at such a challenging time.

John Bidwell – census update

- UWHC working hard to support the census. Census is a moving target the past couple of weeks.
- Putting together phone bank for hard to reach populations.
- Normally 500K vols fanning out across the nation to get data in person. That is not happening this year.
- Date for census has been pushed back.
- Working with Patrick Beaudry from PVPC putting together nonprofit phone bank – would organizations be willing to share client list for this purpose? There might be a large or small phone bank to reach out to people, depending on call lists and need. Please get in touch with John about any census questions.
 - Mary says CAPV may do an internal phone bank rather than send a client list to PVPC. Mary working on easy census scripts to add to regular client check in calls.
- Highland Valley may be including census outreach to their clients during regular calls.
- Other organizations may not have the capacity to add this to their current workload.
