PARSHAT YITRO Torah Tidbits

- Moshe's father in law, Yitro, visits
- Yitro suggested a court system for Bnei Yisrael that maximizes efficiency and delegates some of Moshe's heavy responsibilities, and it is eventually established.
- Moshe goes up Har Sinai to speak to G-d.
- He receives the Ten Commandments and relays most of them to Bnei Yisrael. They are:
 - Belief in Hashem
 - Prohibition to serve idols
 - Prohibition to take Hashem's name in vain
 - Remember Shabbat and sanctify it
 - Honor your father and mother
 - Prohibition to murder
 - Prohibition to commit adultery
 - Prohibition to steal/kidnap
 - Prohibition to testify falsely
 - Prohibition to covet anything not ours
- The Haftorah is from the book of Isaiah, and portrays his vision of the Heavenly Merkavah (chariot), a revelation similar to the one that all of the Jews experienced at Har Sinai


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Parsha Facts

Halacha of the Week - Standing for the Aseret HaDibrot

- Ashkenazim stand for the reading of the "Ten Commandments" while Sephardim do not
 - If one normally stands for Torah reading, then there isn't such a controversial dispute
- Some recommend standing for the entire Parsha as to not give the impression that certain verses are more important than others (by only specifically rising for these verses and then sitting down for the remainder)
