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## Inspirational Story:

As Friday afternoon came about, Yom Kippur was soon to start in China. Senior Israeli tennis player Dudi Sela was in the final quarter of the Shenzhen tournament drawing a tie with his opponent. He walked off the court saying that Yom Kippur was starting and that he would not play during the holy days, thus forfeiting the potential to win \$34,000 for the match and points on the international tennis ratings. Dudi's brother posted of his pride toward him: "Dudi wasn't obligated to leave the match but did it anyway. Not for anyone or any fear no one asked him to do this and he wasn't doing it to gain favor in anyone's eyes. ### Melacha Of The Week:

צובע - Dyeing

- This includes coloring (or darkening) anything which is usually colored or painted
  - It is rabbinically prohibited to temporarily dye something on Shabbat
  - One may also not wear makeup on Shabbat, since it is coloring the skin
    - Some say that sunbathing is considered coloring the skin, so it is not allowed as well
  - Coloring food is allowed since food is meant to be eaten, not to be art
