Earlier this month, the Senate passed the 60th annual National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). This legislation supports our troops and their families, and strengthens our national defense. As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee and Chairman of the Armed Services Cybersecurity Subcommittee, passing a strong, bipartisan NDAA each year is a priority for Senator Rounds. This year's NDAA included a number of provisions he offered, including language to address the Air Force's bomber shortfall, which directly supports the B-21 bomber program and Ellsworth Air Force Base. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently gave the greenlight for the Pfizer and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines to be distributed in the U.S. These safe and effective vaccines are now being administered across the country, and we're optimistic that we'll be able to get back to normal soon. The House and Senate passed veterans' legislation that included Senator Rounds' bill to end veteran homelessness. This legislation now awaits President Trump's signature to become law. No man or woman who has served our nation should be without a place to call home. The bill seeks to make sure each veteran has the resources needed to find a home.

National Defense Authorization Act

Dusty voted in favor of the National Defense Authorization Act that passed the House and Senate with veto-proof majorities and it includes Dusty's legislation to streamline defense acquisitions. The President issued a statement indicating he would veto the bill in its current form, though it's unclear if he will follow-through on that threat.

Government Funding

A bill to extend the continuing resolution (CR) by one week passed the House and the Senate by voice vote to extend the deadline to next Friday, December 18th. Talks are getting closer on a government funding bill, though as of 8am Friday morning they have not posted a CR so a short government shutdown is possible.

COVID Relief

Dusty led the Problem Solvers Caucus group that negotiated the compromise agreement that has now been renamed the "908 Coalition." The group released a section by section of the deal, but text is still waiting agreement on liability protections. Any deal struck is likely to be tied to government funding.

Surprise Medical Billing

The one bit of good news to share is that a bipartisan, bicameral surprise billing agreement was announced, surprise billing has been a priority of Dusty's during his first term and this package will be included in an end of year omnibus bill. Surprise medical billing occurs when a person receives

an unexpectedly high medical bill as a result of being out-of-network. This usually occurs in emergency situations.

This legislation protects patients from unexpected medical bills for out-of-network services. Rather than establish a federal rate setting system, it would allow providers and insurance companies to resolve payments through arbitration.

The City observed the third largest November for permits issued in 2020. In November, 403 permits were issued, with a total valuation of \$18,011,483. We are nearing a valuation total of \$260 million for the year.

Beginning in January, the City will resume discontinuation of residential and commercial utility services for non-payment of utility bills. This practice was suspended in March due to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. Citizens who continue to experience a significant financial hardship caused by the COVID-19 pandemic can apply for an exemption on a form available on the City's website: www.rcgov.org/covid19.



The Home Rule Charter Committee will be making a recommendation to Council at some point in 2021, but a date has yet to be determined. On May 4, 2020, City Council authorized this committee to be in place for up to one year. More information on Home Rule can be found at www.rapidcityhomerule.org.
