Executive Director's Report

Aberdeen, Pinehurst and Southern Pines

TJCOG Planner Jenny Halsey and I met with the managers of Aberdeen, Pinehurst and Southern Pines on November 8. The purpose of the meeting was to put final touches on a draft charter for the joint Aberdeen/Pinehurst and Southern Pines group that TJCOG will be facilitating, as well as to begin brainstorming potential topics for the group to work on. Additionally, I received an endorsement from the managers to put together a Moore County Managers group, facilitated by TJCOG. The group will bring together the municipal managers and county manager to discuss issues of importance.

Assisting Town of Robbins

The Town Manager of Robbins, the state US EDA representative, and myself met on November 6 to discuss potential EDA assistance opportunities for the Town. I am also following up with UNC Chapel Hill on potential resources and we will continue working with Robbins on opportunities as they develop.

Regional Mayor and Chairs Meeting

The Regional Mayors and Chairs met on November 2 to hear a presentation from TJCOG Regional Planning Director John Hodges-Copple on TJCOG's work on Transit Oriented Design for the Durham/Orange Light Rail project and recently begun work around the Wake Transit Plan. Regional Emissions Reductions with Passenger Rail Promotion

NCDOT has done extensive work to improve the passenger rail infrastructure throughout the State of North Carolina. TJCOG will be working collaboratively with Piedmont Triad Regional Council and Centralina COG to develop and implement a program that encourages passenger rail use along the corridor linking the urban crescent of North Carolina. Specifically, this project will form partnerships with Chambers of Commerce, Downtown Development Associations, Transit Authorities and Convention and Visitors Bureaus to form an education and marketing campaign targeted at increasing utilization of this existing and newly improved transportation system for accessing these metropolitan areas. Additionally, this project will provide education on first-mile/last-mile solutions for travelers once they arrive at their destination. The program's goal is to help to divert thousands of avoided vehicle trips and significantly reduce the emissions generated from travel to economic centers within the state. Working in tandem with the current update to the NCDOT Transportation Demand Management (TDM) plan, this project will leverage existing and established TDM programs and capabilities in the designated metro regions to expand the engagement, education and outreach efforts to a broader array of businesses and travelers.



Brownfields Technical Assistance

TJCOG will be engaging with member governments over the next few months to assess interest to start a regional brownfields program. We will be soliciting feedback from member committees to provide us information on their current programs, challenges, and missed opportunities. 
Leadership Triangle Alumni Network (LTAN) Affordable Housing Forum Part II
