Opioid Overdose Response Training, cont.

Chesapeake Employers is authorized by the Maryland Department of Health to conduct NARCAN® (Naloxone) training under the Maryland Overdose Response Program. The goal of the program is to reduce opioid overdose deaths through education and training on the administration of NARCAN® when encountering a potential overdose situation.

In 2020, Chesapeake Employers is offering free, 90-minute training seminars across Maryland, on how to recognize and respond to an opioid overdose by using NARCAN®, an intranasal prescription medication that is used to reverse an opioid overdose.

Each attendee who completes the 90-minute training seminar will receive:

IMPORTANT: Registered attendees WILL NOT RECEIVE ACTUAL NARCAN® at the completion of the training. Attendees will receive a voucher for two doses of NARCAN® that can be filled at a Maryland CVS pharmacy.

Due to limited seating (maximum 60 per class), preregistration online is required. Walk-up registrations will not be accepted.

Who Should Attend?

Registration is open to anyone. Registrants must be 18 years of age or older.

What Will I Learn?

Training participants will learn:

- What is an opioid
- How to recognize and respond to an opioid overdose
- How to administer intranasal NARCAN® to reverse an opioid overdose

What is Naloxone?

Naloxone is a prescription medicine that reverses an opioid overdose by restoring breathing. It cannot be used to get high and it is not addictive. Naloxone can be injected into a muscle or vein or sprayed up the nose.
