SERMA Marks 30th Anniversary; **Attracts 200 at Annual Conference**

"The SERMA Conference's 30th Anniversary was a huge success," announced Kristin Klein, Director of Safety Services and Chair of the SERMA Risk Management Committee. Early results indicated "all positive feedback" from some of the 211 guests who represented 17 State agencies and attended the event at the Boumi Shriner's Temple in Rosedale on Thursday, May 23.

Main speaker Joy Strand, Executive Director of the Maryland Medical Cannabis Commission, spoke to a packed ballroom about the work of the newly formed Commission.

Break-out sessions included:

- The Maryland State Police's Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) training;
- Maryland Occupational Safety and Health's (MOSH's) Indoor Air Quality program;
- Maryland Department of Health's (MDH's) overview of Tickborne Diseases in Maryland; and
- The Maryland Department of the Environment's (MDE's) Weight Management and Aging presentation.

• Safety representatives were also on hand to demonstrate the new Virtual Reality safety training system to eager attendees.

SERMA is tasked by Executive Order with improving workplace safety for the State's 80,000 employees. The organization was established in 1989; 2019 marked its 30th successful year. The day-long event culminates in an awards program. This year, eight SER-MA Awards were presented to deserving individuals and teams, and 25 Injury Reduction Awards were presented to deserving facilities and agencies.

security enhancements for

Department of Social Services. The goal of the team is
to provide the safest environment possible within the
facility.

In 2018, the P.E.A.C.E. Team coordinated with the local Sheriff's Department on two efforts:

1) How to safely arrange interview room office furniture so employees being interviewed don't feel cornered; and 2) How to protect yourself if there is a shooter in the building.

Additionally, to enhance employee safety, the team purchased bullet-proof clipboards for the front lobby and motion-activated security lighting for the back parking lot.

Safety Committee Maryland Aviation Administration

In July 2018, Maryland Aviation Administration's (MAA's) Safety Committee developed the initiative of implementing safety briefing cards in every conference room at BWI. The safety briefing cards help prepare employees on what to do in the event of an emergency at the airport.

The Safety Committee met with MAA leadership and gained support for this initiative to become a new standard for the organization.

Since August 2018, the safety briefing cards have been used in all-employee meetings and in executive leadership team meetings.

Ramp Safety Task Force Maryland Aviation Administration

In 2018, Maryland Aviation Administration's (MAA's) Ramp Safety Task Force developed the goal of enhancing the safety culture at the MAA. To accomplish this goal, the team created a video demonstrating safety techniques and behaviors that spoke not only to MAA employees but to the airport's 12,000 partners.

The video proved to be a success and was appreciated by senior management so much that it is now a tool used in new employee orientations.
