## **School Board – Administrator Retreat**

This past Monday night the school district held its' first School Board/Administrator Retreat. The purpose of the retreat was to provide some time for the entire School Board and Administrative team to be together for an open discussion about school related topics.

The following topics were on the agenda for discussion:

- In-town Bussing Pilot Program
- Staffing/Programming PK-12

A potential “In-town Bussing Pilot Program” was discussed that would provide school bussing at various locations through-out the city of Yankton. We know there are students who live a long distance from school and their only way to school is to walk. This creates situations where some students are consistently late for school or don’t make it to school. We also know a number of parents leave for work early in the morning and are not able to see their children off to school. Perhaps an “In-town Bussing Pilot Program” would provide a much needed service to students and their families.

A committee will be formed to gather more information regarding an “In-town Bussing Pilot Program” and make a recommendation to the School Board later this school year.

### **FFA Program at Yankton High School**

Bringing back the Future Farmers of America program at Yankton High School has been part of our 5 Year Strategic Plan and is now a reality.

The current FFA program in Yankton consists of 35 students all enrolled in the “Introduction to Agriculture” course at Yankton High School. The number of students in FFA will grow during spring semester by 20, based on class registration numbers.

This fall, the group toured the grand opening of Dakota Plains Ag Center (NAPA Junction) while learning about the basics of crop production in the Midwest. Students were also introduced to land judging criteria and some participated in a land judging competition against other regional high schools. Along with land judging competition, some students also competed in Leadership Development Events (LDE’s) where they created resumes, cover letters, and mock interviewed for various agricultural employment positions.

This fall, two Yankton FFA students traveled to Indianapolis to join 65,000 other high school students for the National FFA Convention. While at the convention, students were able to watch schools from across the country compete in various career and leadership competitions, while also developing lifelong relationships with other FFA members state and nationwide. This spring, students will participate in state Career Development Events (CDE’s) such as: Ag Mechanics, Livestock Judging, Milk Quality and Products, Nursery and Landscape, and many other topics.

The FFA program received a \$500 matching grant from the state of South Dakota for a community service related project. The students built a raised garden bed at Stewart Elementary and plan to work closely with the elementary students to plant, grow, and harvest vegetables for their own consumption as well as possibly donating to the “Food for Thought” program. The students also helped Wester Elementary build and install a “Buddy Bench” for students to use while on the playground at recess.

### **Elementary School Garden**

Stewart School and Yankton High School's FFA Program are working together to build a school garden. Yankton High School FFA class under the leadership of teacher Brandon Wagner was looking for a project that would help elementary students. Building a school garden made sense as the elementary science curriculum studies plants and how they grow and FFA's mission is to prepare students for successful careers in the global agriculture, food, fiber and natural resources systems.

The FFA students first task was to design a raised garden that would be easily accessed by elementary students, be easy to mow around and be aesthetically fitting for a school yard. FFA also needed to come up with ways to irrigate the soil and problem solve issues with the strength of the garden to hold the weight of the dirt. The results were outstanding as the cedar wood used will last many years and the watering soaker system will keep the soil moist for the plants.

Next spring the elementary students will get a chance to get their hands dirty and plant seeds and plants along with the assistance of the high school students. FFA also plans to look at soil

conditions and soil testing to make sure conditions are good for growing. Stewart families along with FFA members will volunteer to maintain the garden over the summer. Farming depends a lot on the weather and with a good growing season we hope to raise vegetable that will be donated to the local “Food for Thought” program at Lincoln Elementary. Families will be supplied with fresh vegetables and the students, both FFA and elementary, will walk away with the skills and knowledge to know where our food comes from and the work involved to produce our food sources.
