STREETS GLEAM IN COLORS AS DELEGATES TO REUNION COME

GATHERING OF RAIN CLOUDS CAUSE NO GLOOM  
IN BUSINESS DISTRICT OF STERLING

As clouds gathered over Sterling this afternoon with the promise of needed rain, there was no trace of gloom in the business district of Sterling. Buildings throughout the district gleamed in the colors of purple and white and red and blue in anticipation of the opening of the annual convention of the Colorado Elks' state reunion association this evening. The advance guard of the convention was arriving, and everywhere on the streets were to be seen groups of men, badge-bedecked and dressed jauntily in summer attire.

At noon forty-seven delegates to the convention had registered at the Elks' home, where a tent has been raised for a registration booth. At 2 o'clock the number had grown to more than a hundred. A rapid increase in the registration is anticipated this evening as incoming trains bring scores and other scores come by auto mobile



from near-by cities, just in time for the opening session of the convention. It has been expected that only a few Elks, aside from the Greeley Delegation who stage the initiation of candidates this evening, would arrive today. Some Denver men were here soon after noon, however, and it was reported that delegations from Leadville and Fort Morgan probably would arrive by evening, in order to see the convention from its beginning.

Among the Greeley Elks were Exalted Ruler J. H. Redman, Past Exalted Ruler R.E. Hanna and Loyal Knight Dr. Haefeli. R. B Kendall, exalted ruler of the Grand Junction lodge, also arrived this afternoon. George Shransky, celebrated golfer reached Sterling this afternoon with a following of Fort Morgan Elks.

will be a much larger day in the matter of attendance than has been expected.

The trapshooting, tennis and golf tournaments open simultaneously tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Sterling merchants have prepared well for the visitors. Stores have been decorated throughout with much thought and striking effects in the Elks colors have been attained. Windows contain displays of the most striking beauty. Floats for the illuminated parade of tomorrow evening, which combine ingenuity and graceful lines with the elks' colors have been prepared and the parade undoubtedly will be the most novel thing of its kind ever seen in Northeastern Colorado.

## Public Concert This Evening

While the principal event of interest to Elks today is the session at the home at which a class of candidates will be initiated, a program for the public beginning at 10:30 o'clock will be held. This will be preceded, at 8 o'clock, by the weekly concert of the Sterling Municipal band.

Tomorrow's program will include, besides the tournaments, an Elks'

carnival at the fair grounds, baseball games between Canon City Elks and the combined forces of the Cripple Creek and Victor, informal dancing at the home, meetings of exalted rulers and secretaries, an evening garden party for Elks and their ladies at the courthouse lawn, the illuminated parade, dancing at the Elks home, band concerts at the courthouse park, and midnight follies for Elks.

The aeroplane from the Denver field of the Curtis-Humphreys company, the arrival of which was scheduled to mark the opening of the convention, reached Sterling ahead of time, about 11:30 o'clock. Accompanying the aviator Bert Cole is a parachute jumper, James Cochran, who is expected to give exhibitions during the convention. This feature of the convention is one provided by the Denver lodge.

### CARNATION SUMMER SALAD

(MAKES 6 SERVINGS)

2 Packages (3 ounces each)  
lemon flavored gelatin dessert  
1 cup hot water  
1 cup undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk  
¼ cup lemon juice  
1 cup chopped cooked ham  
(or canned luncheon meat)  
½ cup chopped celery  
¼ cup chopped green onions  
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper  
2 tablespoons chopped green olives  
2 tablespoons chopped pimiento  
1 tablespoon steak sauce  
½ teaspoon salt

## Colorful Colorado:

### The Great Wall of China Hoax

On a hot summer's day in June, 1899, four Denver newspapermen had a problem: they were low on news. The four men represented some of Denver's most popular papers of the time: *Post*, *Republican*, *Times*, and the *Rocky Mountain News*. Depending on who you read, they were either all independently assigned to the 'downtown beat' or were waiting at the train station to see if someone interesting arrived to write about. No one had. The group retires to a local watering hole to commiserate about their ill fortune.

One of the men – sources differ on who – proposed a solution: make something up. They needed column inches filled after all! The group settled on a fake but rather harmless article about the Great Wall of China. The story concocted was as follows: Henry Lewis, an engineer from Chicago, was on his way to China because the Chinese government was planning to demolish the Great Wall and wanted bids for the process. Several Denver papers printed the story as a small column, though the Denver Public Library notes that *Rocky Mountain News* never did

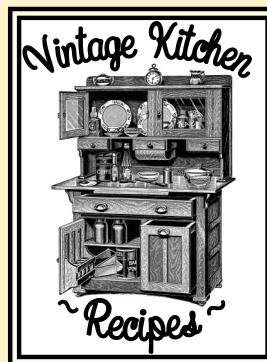
for an unknown reason. From there, it spreads the next few days in small articles as far as Chicago and Washington D.C as papers reprint and occasionally add their own comment.

The hoax is basically forgotten until 1939, when Harry Lee Wilber writes an account of it for the *North American Review*. Wilber leans in and adds plenty of salacious details, like debates among the four men and strident headlines that didn't exist. As the Denver Public Library notes in its account – Wilber almost perpetuated a hoax of his own! Notably, Wilber states that the Chinese populace heard about the supposed plan to tear the Great Wall down and it kicked off the Boxer Rebellion. Suffice to say, this is patently untrue. The Denver Public Library traces Wilber's source material to a sermon from Bishop Henry Warren, one of those 'be careful what you say' tales.

Wilber's elaboration on the hoax spreads, and his accounting is republished in books about hoaxes in the 1950's and 1970's. The story lives on today, with a play by Lloyd Suh, an article from the Denver Public Library, and even its own Wikipedia page. Not too bad for a tall tale concocted in a bar!

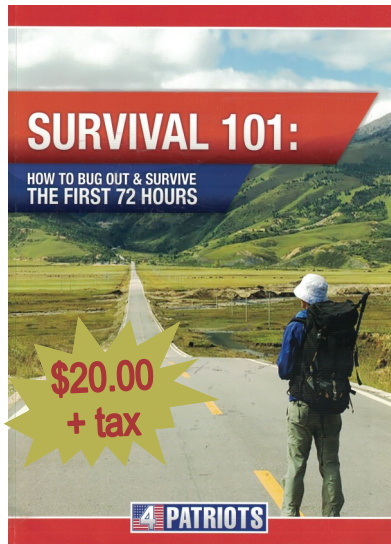
#### A RECIPE FROM MARY BLAKE—FAVORITE RECIPES

Dissolve lemon gelatin in hot water. Chill to a thick syrup. Chill Carnation in refrigerator tray until soft ice crystals form around edges of tray (15 to 20 minutes). Whip until stiff (about 1 minute). Add lemon juice and whip very stiff (about 2 minutes longer). Combine ham and vegetables with steak sauce and salt in bowl. Fold in whipped Carnation and chilled gelatin. Blend thoroughly and place in 1 1/2 - quart mold. Chill until firm (about 2 hours). Unmold by dipping in hot water for a few seconds, and serve on platter lined with salad greens.

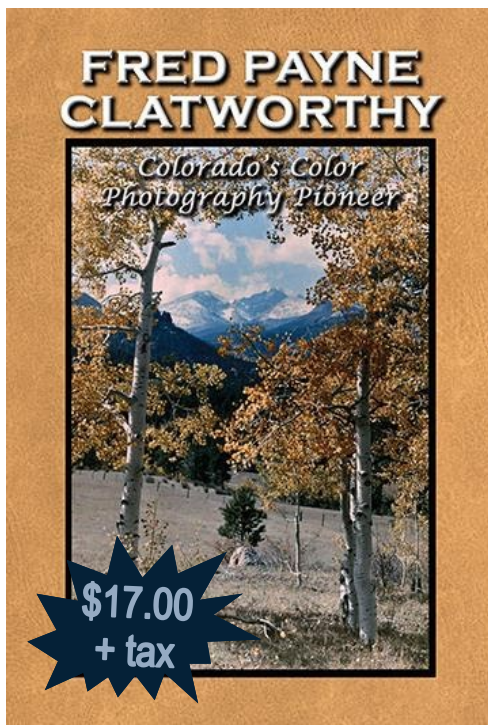

## *"Always in Search of Pictures"*

In the early 1900s Fred Payne Clatworthy was one of the first Americans to use the autochrome, the first practical form of color photography, and to be commercially successful with it. A notable landscape photographer in both color and black and white, he traveled the equivalent of twenty-five times around the globe capturing scenes that he projected on a giant screen for audiences numbering in the thousands; *National Geographic* magazine published six series of his autochromes featuring images of Rocky Mountain National Park, Mesa Verde, the Grand Canyon, Bryce Canyon, Zion, Glacier and Yellowstone National Parks. During his sixty-five-year career, he operated a photography studio, gift shop and ice cream parlor in Estes Park, Colorado.

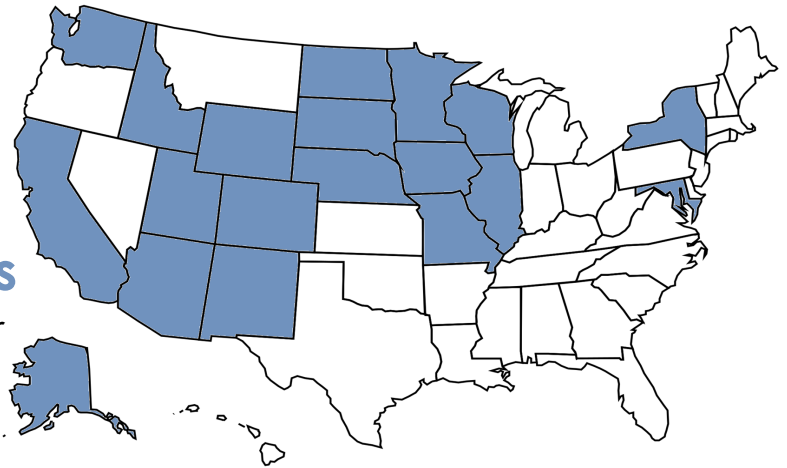
