LIVE as CHILDREN of LIGHT

- Hitoshi's Reflection

We are in Lent, the season when we remember the suffering of the Lord. For some reason Hitoshi began to spend his days intensely reading the four Pauline Epistles. 13 of the 27 books of New Testaments are said to be written by the apostle Paul, and 4 of them were written when he was in prison. They were specifically, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon.

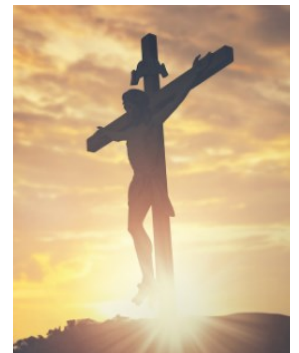
Many of the familiar verses have been rediscovered as St. Paul's writing in prison. For example, although they are not singing this year due to Corona, on Sundays during Lent, Japanese Lutheran congregations chant: "he humbled himself, and became obedient to the point of death – even death on a cross."

This verse was written by Paul in prison. (Philippians 2: 8). And the title "Live as Children of Light" is from the verse Ephesians 5:8.

Furthermore, from prison, St. Paul wrote a surprising verse, "I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church." The words made Hitoshi think that Paul saw the Light of Jesus on the cross, even if he was buried, but conquered death by Jesus' death. And he hopes to be brave enough to endure any further sufferings coming for the body of Christ.

At the US Presidential Inauguration on January 21st broadcasted worldwide, 22-year-old Amanda Gorman was reading her very meaningful poem. Hitoshi felt like it was a sermon rather than a poem. It began with the question, "When day comes we ask ourselves, where can we find light in this never-ending shade?" And at the end of the five-minute reading, it concluded with, "For there is always light, if only we're brave enough to see it. If only we're brave enough to be it."

During this Lenten journey, let's be brave enough to see the light on the cross, and remember that we are brave enough to be the light on the cross when we were baptized as Children of Light. Amen.
