First, we would like to welcome Logan Del Rio, to our Kids For Kids Family. We are so glad he has joined Blue Door. This week we learned about Flowers. During Circle Time the teacher talked about different flowers such as the carnation, tulip, sunflower, orchid, and rose. The teacher also reviewed the shapes and colors.

For Art, the flower handprint was fun for the children. They dipped their hands into paint (purple) and then onto construction paper. They used green craft sticks as the stem. Given a small paper plate, they decorated it using do-a-dot markers and once again added a craft stick the color of their choice. By gluing tissue paper to a small paper plate, they made another beautiful flower. They colored in a sunflower that was drawn on construction paper and glued the stem to it and also glued a brown circle in the middle of the sunflower which represents the seed. They worked in their journals by coloring a flower and gluing mosaic squares to it. Rolling and flattening Play-Doh was a blast. They made flowers by using different Play-Doh cutters that were of different flowers.

Center time is always fun for them, they love to play with the blocks and nailed different things. Housekeeping and feeding the baby dolls are a big favorites. It is so interesting and enjoyable to see how they use their imaginations at such a young age.

Tearing paper is an amazing fine motor activity for your child. It is a simple fine motor activity that requires only scrap paper and for the child's hands. Tearing paper actually helps children develop many essential skills: hand strength, hand-eye coordination, precision refined movements, and bilateral coordination. Building with Legos is another motor skill, and puzzles as well.

Parents, please wash your child's blanket and return it to school nice and clean on Monday. Make sure your child's nails are cut short so that way they do not scratch themselves or their friends. If your child is sick DO NOT SEND THEM TO SCHOOL, we understand missing work is very hard, but sending your child sick to school, even with a cold, is NOT FAIR to the teacher and other children. If we see your child is sick and even with a runny nose, we will call you and ask you to come to pick them up. If you know your child is sick and still send them sick to school please don't be upset when you receive a call asking you to come to pick up your child.
