Dear Parents,

This week our students have learned about the letter Oo and Owls. Our class has been learning vocabulary words about owls, such as wingspan, talons, owlet, camouflage, prey, down, nocturnal, hatch, and nest. There are around 200 different owl species. Owls are nocturnal which means that like bats they are active at night and hunt for food. Most owls hunt insects, small mammals, and other birds. Some owl species hunt fish. Owls have powerful talons (claws) which help them catch and kill prey. Owls can turn their heads as much as 270 degrees. Baby owls are called "owlets" and a group of owls is called a "parliament". The wingspan of an owl can be up to an impressive six feet.

Academic enrichment and Art:

We have also taken the opportunity to stick with the letter O theme and discuss Opposites. They all have done so well grasping the concept of what opposites are, and excitedly raised hands to answer questions.

For Art - the students traced and colored the letter of the week, they practiced writing the Uppercase O and the lower case o. They've traced and cut out the letter O and decorated it to look like an owl. The students also traced an owl stencil, cut it and decorated it with feathers.

Journal- for journals the students drew a picture from the story "Owl Babies". They also made their own owlets sitting on a branch using construction paper and cotton balls.

Academic Enrichment- the students wrote words and drew pictures with the letter O. They wrote their vocabulary words that were included in the stories we've read about owls and drew pictures to match the meaning. Every afternoon we take a few minutes to do an activity or play a game that will encourage learning. This week the students matched capital and lowercase letters. They played, Simon Says and listened to different sounds.

This week we went to the garden and the students, with the help of the teachers, planted tomato plants. We will continue to visit the garden weekly to water the plants and watch as the plants grow.

On Thursday we also had an in-house field trip from the Miami Children's Museum. The students watched an awesome Halloween themed song and dance performance and listened to some stories too.

Books we read:

My O Book, Incredible Owls, Owls, Egg to Owl, Owl Babies, and The Sleepy Owl.
