




Vehicular Hijacking (“VH”) and Aggravated Vehicular Hijacking (“AVH”) incident trends from 2016-2021





FOUR INDEPENDENT STRATEGIES UNDERLIE OUR COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH



Independent Strategies are connected by a Team of Teams

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Coordinate law enforcement resources to share information efficiently

- Investigative Teams | *Bureau of Detective (“BOD”): 5 Areas, Centralized Team*
- Custom Notifications | *Bureau of Patrol (“BOP”), CAPS*
- Intelligence | *ATF, Bureau of Counterterrorism (“CT”), Strategic Decision Support Centers (“SDSC”)*
- Enforcement Teams | *BOP: 5 Areas*
- Evidence Teams | *BOD: ETs*

PROSECUTION

Coordinate resources to build stronger cases utilizing special prosecution

- Chicago Police Department (“CPD”) | *BOD, BOP*
- Cook County State’s Attorney’s Office (“CCSAO”)
- Judges
- Federal Partners

YOUTH INTERVENTION

Work with partners to ensure services are provided to youth

- CPD | *CAPs, District Coordination Officers (“DCO”), BOP*

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Share public engagement content to reach all of Chicago’s residents

- CPD | *CAPs, District Commanders, News Affairs*
- Elected Officials | *City and State*



Law Enforcement Actions

PREVENTATIVE ACTIONS

- Custom Notify juveniles who are at risk
- Districts conduct missions at incident and known drop point locations
- Continuous investigation of social media
- Conduct high visibility patrol on prioritized ingress and egress routes
- Conduct rollcall training for district officers about responding to a vehicular hijacking (e.g. what to ask victims, notifications to be made immediately, tips for better case writing, etc.)

INCIDENT RESPONSE ACTIONS

- Respond to vehicular hijackings like shootings and homicides
- Issue flash message providing make/model and plate information
- Send citywide notification via CW7
- Notify Detective Division immediately via phone call from CW7
- Review hits on LPR and POD cameras immediately

INVESTIGATIVE ACTIONS

- Conduct rollcall training with detectives about key reminders for vehicular hijacking
- Connect investigation with District SDSC and Tact Office
- Develop an information sharing button the Wire Homepage
- Conduct training with ASAs to ensure CPD is providing the strongest cases for felony charges
- Analyze cases citywide to develop trends and crews
- Conduct multiple information sharing sessions weekly to share trends and crews
- Coordinate with partners including rideshare and food delivery companies

- Special Prosecution set up to include:
 - CCSAO
 - Feds
 - Juvenile ASA
 - Chief Judge Evans and Judge Toomin
 - CPD
