Interpretation & Explanation by Mr. Anderson

Three thoughts from this Scripture (paraphrased from Pastor David Guzik: Calvary Chapel Santa Barbara, California)

"Fear not, for I am with you": This is both a command and a promise. Israel is commanded to fear not. Fear, worry, and anxiety are often sin. This is the God who rules over the nations and is the creator of the universe. When that God tells us fear not, we must take it seriously! But there is also a promise. We fear not, because the LORD has told us, I am with you. What more do we need? If God is for us, who can be against us? (Romans 8:31) And because our God has given us this command and promise we can know that every fear we face God has a provision of courage for us to access.

"Be not dismayed, for I am your God": It is as if God is saying, "Remember Me? The God of all power and glory? I'm that one. I am your God." In these words, God shows how when we his people forget the greatness of our God, we easily become dismayed and discouraged. But God says, be not dismayed, for I am your God. We must know that in order to find our courage we must start by remembering who we belong to.

"I will strengthen you, Yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand": God's strength and glory make Him able to help us. But it is His love that makes Him say, "I will help you." The God, our God, we need to remember is one who is willing to both strengthen

Student Entrepreneurship & Artistic Achievements:



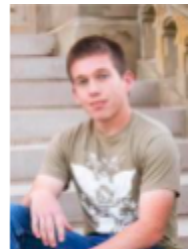

Received the “Most Respectful Student” award in Singapore during her sophomore year.

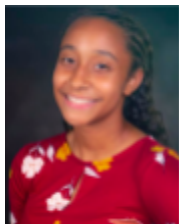
Academic Achievements:
