When I first joined the AOLS Council in 2010 one of my concerns was the “sustainability of the profession”. Our numbers were decreasing, the majority of members were over 50 and there were less than 40 students Articling to become surveyors. Through a strategic planning process actions were identified that Council felt would help attract more students to our profession.

Over the past 7 years, through the hard work of AOLS committees and staff, many of these actions have been undertaken and although our membership has decreased by 20% since 2010 the number of Articling Students has more than doubled. Thanks to the efforts of the Public Awareness Committee, the Geomatics Recruitment and Liaison Committee and the Academic and Experience Requirements Committee we now have over 80 Articling Students.

These numbers are encouraging but in order to keep our numbers healthy in the long term we need to continue to raise awareness of the profession and the employment opportunities in surveying. In addition, we need to ensure that there is a clearly defined path for students to follow to obtain the education required to become a surveyor. I feel this would best be accomplished through the establishment of a university program designed to meet the specific requirements of the AOLS.

A sustainable survey profession requires more than healthy membership numbers – it requires members who are engaged, who participate on committees and who attend Association meetings and educational programs.

The introduction of mandatory Continuing Professional Development has resulted in a more engaged membership and, I believe, a more respected profession. Attendance at Regional Group meetings and our AGM has increased as has participation on committees and task forces. We are now into our second 3 year cycle and the Continuing Education Committee continues to work on improving the system and facilitating meaningful seminars and webinars. I encourage everyone to participate now – don’t leave it to the last year.

I believe a sustainable survey profession requires strong representation from all disciplines of Geomatics. The feedback from the 2016 Survey Monkey on Certificate of Registration indicates that most C of R holders feel there is value in being members of the AOLS. We need to continue to work with this group to identify their needs, to provide relevant programs and to promote the benefits of membership to other Geomatics practitioners.

Finally, to remain a sustainable profession we must also have a financially stable organization. In recent years legal costs for the Constitutional Challenge and for Discipline have put a strain on our financial resources. For 2017 Council will continue to operate in a fiscally responsible manner to ensure the AOLS is financially stable now and in the future.

2017 promises to be an exciting year as we celebrate Canada's 150th birthday as well as the 125th anniversary of the AOLS. Our book, *Great Lengths – A Celebration of the Surveyors of Ontario*, is complete and will be printed in time for our annual meeting.

Our annual meeting, planned in partnership with l'Ordre des Arpenteurs-géomètres du Québec, and the Association of Canada Lands Surveyors, is being held in Ottawa as part of the National Surveyors' Conference 2017. Surveyors from across Canada will be attending this meeting to learn, network and celebrate surveying in Canada. This is an excellent opportunity to raise the public's awareness of the surveying profession and to highlight the surveyors' contributions to Canada.

I appreciate your support and look forward to serving as President of the AOLS throughout our *Quasquicentennial* year.

As you know there were some unfortunate circumstances just prior to the election notice for the 2017 council going out to the membership. Because of these circumstances council would have been without one senior councilor for 2017. It is my belief that council works much more efficiently and democratically with a full complement of members and I decided therefore to make a one year commitment to the Association and run for senior councilor 2017. There are several issues that council must take on with vigour and with an approach that will bring these issues to fruition or completion. Some of the major issues include;

Continuing Professional Development – The continuing Education Committee has delivered a number of excellent seminars in the past. It is most important that these seminars continue to be offered and that the membership be encouraged to put forward possible topics for future seminars thus making the seminars current and attractive to the membership. Our reporting of our CPD time needs to be easier and more concise. I am sure that moving to a shared reporting with GeoEd is a move in the right direction but we need to insure we can report in a better system than is currently available.

Now that we have completed the first three-year cycle and we are a third of the way through the second cycle perhaps it is time to re-examine the actual time requirements to be reported.

Provincial Wide Survey Records Index - We need to move forward with finalizing the Index and to create a good and proper distribution system. I support this concept but only as an index. We, as an association, should not require our members to go through the expense of scanning all of member records and making these records available immediately. As companies scan their records as a regular piece of their business, those records will become available, but it could be a severe hardship for some firms to do the scanning immediately.

C of R Participation - This issue has been important to me for many years but it still needs the full support of all members. Our membership will only benefit from both professional and the social contacts with the various disciplines.

New Members – Have we rounded the corner on attracting young students to the field of surveying, especially cadastral surveying? The growing number of articling students over the past few years would seem to indicate a new and improved trend but we must continue to develop and increase this trend if we are to remain a strong and viable association. We need to continue with the existing and aggressive approach to making high school and junior college students aware of the opportunities and attractions in following a career in surveying and geomatics.

Legal and Court Challenges – We have seen the association involved with legal or court challenges over the past few years. This is a very expensive proposition which needs to be addressed from not only a legal perspective but also in a fiscally responsible manner. Is the membership getting good value for their money? I believe council should be receptive to enquiries from the membership regarding legal and fiscal concerns.

I believe that our Association, over the last number of years, has been heading in the right direction. Your new council must not only continue to lead the Association along the current path but must also embrace new opportunities and prepare for the new challenges that await us. What I can offer our Association is good management, based on a rational approach, to tackle both current and new challenges. I believe that I will be an asset on council by bringing sound judgment experience to the decision-making process to meet our current and future needs.

I am eager to be your representative as senior councillor for 2017 and I would appreciate your endorsement and support. I look forward to working with the membership and taking on this challenge.
