## Conference Workshops

<i>Track 1 Infant/Toddler Track</i>	<i>Track 2 Preschool Track</i>
<p><b><i>Temperament of Infants and Toddlers: Understanding and Supporting Individual Differences</i></b></p> <p>We all have our own way of adapting and responding to the world around us. Are you distractible or persistent, sensitive or easy going? These characteristics describe temperament. During this workshop, we will learn about nine temperament traits and three large categories used to describe most infants and toddlers. Strategies on how to care for children based on their temperament type will be shared. We will also discuss the “goodness of fit” between your own temperament and the infants and toddlers in your care and explore the role of culture as it relates to temperament. By understanding temperament, caregivers can provide the supports needed to help every infant and toddler feel safe and secure in the child care setting. This training provides information that supports the ITTERS-R subscales: Space and Furnishings, Listening and Talking and Interactions and Program Structure. (DCDEE 2, 3, 4, 8)</p> <p>Trainer: Melinda McCullen, Infant/Toddler Specialist</p>	<p><b><i>Behavioral Intervention Strategies: You want me to try what?</i></b></p> <p>Teachers, who care for children with behavioral difficulties, often find themselves reacting in ways that reinforce the behavior and make it worse. Behavioral intervention strategies are planned responses to behaviors that help teachers prepare for situations in which past responses have not been successful. This session focuses on helping participants develop new responses to challenging behaviors using six key intervention strategies. <p><b><i>Social/Emotional Milestones-Birth to 36 Months: Building Blocks for Future Learning</i></b></p> <p>First, everything is “mine”, then children learn to take turns, and eventually they learn to share. For infants and toddlers this learning happens through relationships and includes developing a sense of self, a sense of self with others, and learning about feelings. All children need an emotionally secure environment that supports healthy development in this learning domain. This workshop examines social/emotional competence as a vital component of later school readiness. Participants will learn how a responsive caregiver can help the youngest of our children form secure attachments, learn to navigate feelings and emotions, and begin to develop self-regulation and social skills, the building blocks for future learning. You don’t have to be a super-hero! 11:15-1:15</i></b></p> <p>Inclusion is no longer a philosophy or a buzzword, but a classroom reality. This workshop will provide practical suggestions for teachers about how to design and implement strategies in inclusive classrooms; including specific ideas for how to design and implement instructional strategies, and determine their success. We will introduce adaptations to make situations better for particular children, including those with challenging behaviors, disabilities, or other special needs or improve situations for an entire group.
