St. Edmund's Events & Updates

A Safe Return

Dear Friends,

Two weeks ago the Governor allowed Houses of Worship to return to in-person worship services. This decision came earlier than expected. There were many guidelines that followed in order for this return to remain safe. The Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles which had been working on guidelines as well, ultimately came out last week with its own set of guidelines for Episcopal churches and clergy in the Diocese. Much of what needs to happen will take time to organize and implement and our Safe Return Task Force is working to insure that we are prepared for an eventual re-opening.

The earliest we can return to worship according to the Diocese is June 21st. While some parishes may open on this date, St. Edmunds will not because there is much to do, and it is our belief that rushing an opening will not be the best decision for the community. We will make a determination of when to open based on the following factors:

1. The County of Los Angeles according to recent reports is seeing a rise in new Covid-19 cases. The next 3-4 weeks will be crucial in determining how the re-opening of businesses, places of worship, and parks will affect a further rise. We choose to wait and see.
2. Protocols and procedures for St. Edmund's need to be implemented and organized to address the Diocesan guidelines. This affects how we clean and sanitize (not to mention we must wait for supply deliveries), how we order our worship services, and how we welcome and seat parishioners and guests, among other adjustments.

While we are all anxious to return, the task force and I want to make sure that we are opening up in a responsible way. Your health and safety is our priority. We are currently writing the protocols and procedures for a Safe Return to St. Edmunds. When they are complete we will make them available to you as soon as possible. Thank you for your patience and your continued commitment! Blessings, Jenifer+

Romans 5:1-8

And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person-- though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.

The Gospel Lesson**Matthew 9:35-10:8**

Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him. These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: “Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, proclaim the good news, ‘The kingdom of heaven has come near.’ Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment. [Take no gold, or silver, or copper in your belts, no bag for your journey, or two tunics, or sandals, or a staff; for laborers deserve their food. Whatever town or village you enter, find out who in it is worthy, and stay there until you leave. As you enter the house, greet it. If the house is worthy, let your peace come upon it; but if it is not worthy, let your peace return to you. If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, shake off the dust from your feet as you leave that house or town. Truly I tell you, it will be more tolerable for the land of Sodom and Gomorrah on the day of judgment than for that town.

“See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves. Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the Gentiles. When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you at that time; for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. When they persecute you in one town, flee to the next; for truly I tell you, you will not have gone through all the towns of Israel before the Son of Man comes.]”
