It was wonderful to see members from Anderson, Chico Breakfast, Enterprise, Fall River, Fort Jones, Lakehead, Shasta Lake, South Siskiyou, Sutter, Trinity Gold Diggers and Trinity Lake joining together to focus on retaining our current members and identifying and recruiting new ones.</p> <p>The main presenter was Past Council Chair Mary Rynearson from San Diego and 1st Vice District Governor Elisa Coyle and Lion Mike Ferrier were also part of the presentation team.</p> <p>As is always the case, it was especially good to hear from our own District Lions about their successes as well as their challenges. We have so many accomplishments and good ideas to share amongst ourselves when we get together at the District level. Let's keep the ball rolling at our next District Meeting on February 23rd at the Sutter Youth Organization Hall.</p>	<p>Service Shapes Our Future</p> <p>Since the start of the current Lions year, our Clubs and our District have been beset by a multitude of unexpected challenges. With fires burning on all sides of us our Lions have been called upon to respond to initial urgent needs of fire survivors and then to seek out our place amongst all of the organizations and entities providing services and support in the aftermath.</p> <p>In our organization as in many others, during periods of time when things are relatively stable and we are focusing on our "tried and true" service projects, it often seems to be the same handful of people who step up to lead these endeavors. However, when urgent or larger-scale needs arise, we often see Lions who normally remain in the background come forward to head up a response to an issue that touches them on a personal level. They may not even realize that they are stepping out of their comfort zone and into a leadership role until they look back to discover that others are following their lead.</p> <p>During the past few months there have been several Lions who have emerged as leaders of our fire relief efforts – some of them surprising even themselves by what they have been able to accomplish. The desire to provide a service is what coaxed these Lions into new roles. Purpose-driven leadership is a powerful thing. Let's be on the lookout for opportunities to recognize our leaders of the future as We Serve together.</p>	<p>Succession Planning</p> <p>As January comes to a close, my thoughts turn to renewal and starting fresh. February soon follows, celebrating the birth of our first President, who famously decided to step aside to give others a chance to lead our Nation. Even though it seems far away, Lions at the Club level and above need to start thinking about who will be asked or needs to be prepared to take on various leadership roles, running the gamut from Activity Chairpersons to Club and District Officers.</p> <p>It may seem early to start this process; but, the benefits are immeasurable. For example, it allows the ability to prepare for unexpected events, like a sudden illness or change in job status of an officer. Succession planning also allows each member to develop their leadership skills as well as giving future leaders the opportunity to move up. So start now by letting your 1st Vice President run a meeting or providing mentorship to a future Activity Chair or Co-Chair. You will be glad you did!</p>

Lions White Cane DAYS 2019

White Cane History

In 1921, James Biggs, a photographer from Bristol, England, became blind following an accident. Because he was feeling uncomfortable with the amount of traffic around his home, he painted his walking stick white to be more easily visible.

In 1930, Lion George A. Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois) introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. The Peoria Lions approved the idea, white canes were made and distributed, and the Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the right-of-way to cross the street. News of the club's activity spread quickly to other Lions clubs throughout the United States, and their visually impaired friends experimented with the white canes. Overwhelming acceptance of the white cane idea by the blind and sighted alike quickly gave cane users a unique method of identifying their special need for travel consideration among their sighted counterparts.

Also, in 1931, in France, Guilly d'Herbemont recognized the danger to blind people in traffic and launched a national "white stick movement" for blind people. She donated 5,000 white canes to people in Paris.

Today white cane laws are on the books of every state in the US and in a few other countries, providing persons who are blind a legal status in traffic. The white cane universally acknowledges that the bearer is blind. It is celebrated internationally on the fifteenth of October.
