1963 - 1964



June, 1963: Father James Lyons is appointed pastor of Saint Charles Borromeo. Monsignor Wogan retires to the rectory, continues to celebrate Masses and performs baptisms.



"We were not trying to be the first parish in the diocese to do things (as Saint Charles became known as the strongest parish on Vatican II in the diocese). I was just following Vatican II and the people took to it. But not all."

August, 1963: A school board is established.

Rosemary Carpenter becomes the first full-time school secretary. Rita Dickerson, part-time secretary under Father Wogan, becomes full-time and remains in the position until 1990.

1964: On the first Sunday after Rome gives permission, Father Lyons faces the people and uses a table from the sacristy as an altar. The altar is moved from the back wall several months later. The laity assumes the roles of lectors and eucharistic ministers in the liturgy.




1964: Father Lyons begins saying Mass in homes and invites families to gather around the altar at the annual Thanksgiving Mass.

1964 - 1966



1964: The Council for Youth is established at Saint Charles to engage youth in parish life.

1964: Four councils are developed (Management, Social Action, Spirituality and Education) to coordinate programs in the parish. Leaders of each council are elected by the congregation.



1965: Father Lyons implements changes in the role of the laity at Saint Charles. The parish is divided in 24 geographical groups with area leaders.

1965: The role of women in ministry is encouraged. Twenty circles emerge from the women's Altar Society, each having a coordinator and educational goals.

1966: Saint Andrew the Apostle Parish is established in Gladstone, Missouri.
