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JIA board apprised of W3 weekend success

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Going over the final results from the Whiskey, Wine & Wildlife event on Jekyll Island, Jekyll Island Authority marketing director Meggan Hood detailed to the Board of Directors the event's progress over its four days.

"It was a raving success," Hood told the board

at its monthly meeting Monday. "I think lots of you got to come and join in the festivities. Some of the highlights here — there are many, many events within this weekend that goes Thursday through Sunday. It starts out Thursday with the wine cruise. That sold out. The events Friday night and Saturday afternoon also sold out completely. This was

the first time for all those events selling out, so that was exciting. We had no at-the-door sales on Saturday, which is the first time for that."

She said educational classes like wine and beer tastings had record attendances, along with adding an additional class because of demand. Record attendances also followed the Thursday night din-

ner, Saturday after-party and Sunday brunch. Hood noted the Westin, in selling packages for the event, sold three in its first year and sold around 60 this year.

"This event is doing nothing but growing, which is wonderful for the island," Hood said.

Meanwhile, the process continues on the northern oceanside portion of the

island to rebuild a rock revetment damaged by hurricanes Matthew and Irma.

"After some unexpected turns there, as far as the Native American archaeological site, we were able to mitigate the requirements there, and agree to some ongoing mitigation efforts that will be part of the actual construction effort," JIA executive director Jones Hooks said.

Good News Club comes to Frederica

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A new club at Frederica Academy aims to show students from a young age that Bible study and worship can be fun.

Frederica Academy started its own chapter of the Good News Club this school year. The program is part of a national organization through which trained volunteers meet with children in schools and provide Bible lessons, worship sessions and student fellowship.

The program is also offered in the elementary schools in the Glynn County School System.

"We just make it all fun while we are still teaching them the word of God and about the Bible, in small steps," said Jenny Thompson, a parent volunteer at Frederica.

The club is led by parent volunteers, all of whom had to undergo training to help with the program.

The goal of the Good News Club, Thompson said, is to plant the seeds of the Bible's message early.

The club is open to first through fifth graders. Thompson said the program targets this age group to provide the education at a young age.

"This is the age where they can still have fun and they do still jump around and worship and raise their hands and can express themselves," she said.

"In middle school, it gets to be a little bit more challenging."

A donation from more than a dozen individuals made the program possible at Frederica Academy.

Ed Ralston, a former school trustee, died last year. A group then came together to make the donation in his name to bring the Good News Club to the school.

"We received several gifts in Mr. Ralston's memory which provided the funding we needed to start the Good News Club," said John Pope, a spokesperson for the school.

At a recent club meeting, Christina Godwin, owner of Christina's Dance World on St. Simons Island, led a special Valentine's Day worship session that centered on the importance of

showing others love.

"Before you ever spend money on a gift, do you know that the best way to share love with your parents is simply all of the things that don't cost a penny — hugs, telling them how much you love them, telling them how much you appreciate everything they do for you," Godwin told the students.

Godwin volunteers with the program as its praise and worship coordinator.

She leads the students in spirited worshipping, transforming the school cafeteria into a dance hall.

She challenged the students that day to go home and research the fruits of the spirit and focus on how they can be better versions of themselves every day.

"God wants us to be like fruit trees," she said. "And when a fruit tree is a good fruit tree, it has fruit on it, right?"

Marcia Smith, a board member for the county-wide Good News Club program, has helped Frederica Academy get its club off the ground. She works as a coordinator for the club at C.B. Greer Elementary. She said she's seen the program completely change students who participate.

"I have seen lives transformed," Smith said.

The students at Frederica Academy have already fallen in love with the club, Smith said.

"They first were a little reluctant and didn't know what it was all about," she said. "At first, they didn't get up and dance like this. But now, this is their club and they are very much a part of this club. They want to take part in all that we do."

The students' prayer requests have changed drastically since the first meeting, Smith said.

"At the beginning of the year, it was 'Dear God, I want this, I want that, do this for me,'" she said. "Now they're thinking of other people and praying for family members, or teachers who are sick."

Thompson said she hopes to see the students grow up and remember the lessons they've learned in the Good News Club.

"You plant the seeds when they're young," she said.
